



Local law enforcers busy with accidents

Gerald E. Minton, 25, of Waplesburg, was admitted to the Nicholas County Hospital Monday afternoon for treatment of head injuries he received when the tractor-trailer truck he was operating turned over after hitting and breaking two telephone poles. According to Nicholas County Sheriff Boone Smith the tractor, loaded with other coal, was traveling along Route 58 toward Millersburg when the driver lost control. The rig which was owned by the Harold F. Dubeck, Inc. Trucking Service in Waplesburg incurred considerable damage according to Boone. "On Monday, May 9," Sheriff said, "another accident occurred about three and one-half miles from Carlisle on Route 58 which left the tractor portion of a tractor-trailer blocking the major portion of the roadway causing a dangerous situation for other drivers until the roadway could be cleared." According to the sheriff Robert E. Satterfield of West Union, Ohio caught the bumper of a coal truck, operated by Clyde Buchanan of Mayville, when Satterfield attempted to pull his station wagon into the right lane of the highway after passing the truck, causing Buchanan to lose control. No injuries were reported. The truck is the property of Clyde Buchanan of Route 4, Mayville.

Carroll, Governor Commonwealth of Kentucky Frankfort, Kentucky Honorable Mildred Clark, County Judge and Member, Nicholas County Fiscal Court Carlisle, Kentucky We have examined the Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances Arising From Cash Transactions of Nicholas County as of June 30, 1975, and the related Statement of Operations From Cash Transactions for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and our opinion included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. During the course of our audit we made several recommendations to the responsible officials which, if implemented, would result in an improved accounting system. Included were many recommendations which were made in our audit report dated April 25, 1975. Following are what we consider to be our most important recommendations. A system of property control should be installed so as to establish control over the County's investments in bond issues. We recommended an annual review by the Fiscal Court of insurance and fidelity bond coverage to determine adequate coverage. In this connection, it was pointed out in our audit report of April 25, 1975, that the bonds of the County Judge, County Court Clerk and Sheriff were inadequate considering the amount of money for which their offices were responsible. This amount is well applicable. All special federal or state grant funds received should be deposited in the County's General Fund and then transferred to a special purpose fund if applicable. This procedure would give recognition to all County revenue in the County's financial statements. Care should be taken to attach purchase orders and receiving reports to paid invoices and to list all bills to be paid in the fiscal court order book when they are approved for payment. Documentation of all advertisements for and acceptance of bids should be filed with copies of all bids submitted on individual projects. If an emergency is declared in connection with a particular advertisement, a certificate of emergency should be filed with the County's chief financial officer as provided by KRS 431.260 and a copy should be retained in the file of the bids. The Statement of Operations herein shows that \$11,911 was transferred from the Equipment Rental Fund to the Road and Bridge Fund. This indicates that the Road and Bridge Fund and Equipment Rental Fund should be combined for clarity in presentation to the County's financial statements. The Survey Fund is maintained to account for payroll withholdings and the County's contribution to Social Security, Retirement and Medical Insurance. Records of this fund should be kept as a single receipt record. In our opinion, the statement mentioned above presents fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balance resulting from cash transactions of Nicholas County as of June 30, 1975, and its revenue collected and expenses paid for the year ended on the cash basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
