LEXIS permits less research for attorneys in Stephen's office

LEXIS is a legal research data computer which, according to Stephens, can do 30 hours of research in less than five minutes. Stephens credited Gov. Carroll with backing Kentucky with the system, which about 25 other states also utilize.

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Stephens said the system, now used by almost 25 state governments, would "make each lawyer more productive" and help them make "better use of their time."

The assistance to which Stephens referred is LEXIS, a legal research data computer. Representatives of Mead Data Central, LEXIS' programmer, have planned the system in the Attorney General's Law Library and have been training attorneys in its use for the past week.

Stephens said Gov. Carroll funded the installation of the system plus the first 16 months of its use through the Governor's Contingency Fund. The 1978 General Assembly will approve any records for the program after that period.

In the next executive budget, Stephens said the system, now used by almost 25 state governments, would "make each lawyer more productive" and help them make "better use of their time."

He illustrated the worth of the system as a time-saver by telling about the installation of the system plus the first 16 months of its use through the Governor's Contingency Fund. The 1978 General Assembly will approve any records for the program after that period.

Unemployment is presenting President Carter to restore full diplomatic and trade relations with Cuba. These groups he observed, smile lovingly at Latin America's most developed economy. "Ignoring the price Cuba paid for 15 months of political disaster," he noted that, "The same communists who publicly denounce the lack of civil liberties in Chile somehow are not concerned with a lack of academic freedom at the University of Havana."

Prof. Alky added: "The business lobbyists small, unlike the 600 million. But the catch is that Cuba has no reserve currency. It mortgages its sugar crop to pay for Russian oil and European machinery. The Castro government wants the United States to unfreeze bank deposits in the U.S. claimed by Cuba. These were frozen when Castro confiscated \$2 billion worth of U.S. assets in Cuba, calling it 'repression.' But that serves Russia's nationalization with some compensation. Not one cent was ever paid rightful owners."

Prof. Alky added: "The Cubans also want U.S. banks to lend the Castro government funds or lines of credit. These credits would pay the businessmen now lobbying for trade relations with Havana. The American taxpayer would pay the bill. Uncle Sam again could be Uncle Sam."

The truth is that normalized relations between the United States and Cuba is impossible as long as Cuba serves as a base for Soviet forces and Soviet submarines in this hemisphere, and sends expeditionary forces abroad. To urge normal diplomatic trade ties without an end to Cuba's revolutionary activities is the height of irresponsibility.

Unemployment rolls reach lowest levels in Kentucky

FRANKFORT—Kentucky's unemployment rolls have reached their lowest level in more than two and one-half years.

Robert MacDonald, Department for Human Resources chief market analyst, stated, "For the second consecutive month, Kentucky's unemployment has dropped sharply, reflecting a continued improvement in the state's economy."

The unemployment rate for April was 4.4 per cent, down from 4.6 in March and 7.1 in February. This represents a decrease from 17,400 unemployed persons during the past four weeks and 28,800 since February.

The April level equaled that of October 1974.

The national unemployment rate for April was 5.8 per cent, below the 7.9 per cent figure in March.

MacDonald said: "The number of Kentucky residents working in April was an all-time high 1,290,000, reflecting major employment gains in manufacturing (3,700), construction (7,200), Prof. Alky added:

Measles outbreak reaches epidemic proportions in Kentucky

FRANKFORT—A measles outbreak in Kentucky has already reached epidemic proportions with almost 400 cases reported this month alone, according to Dr. Carlos Hernandez, the state's director of preventive services in the Department for Human Resources.

During the same period last year 97 cases were reported.

The recent outbreak in Kentucky and other states could have been prevented considered for immunization at six months. But he noted that such infants must be vaccinated at 15 months in order to have lifetime immunity from measles. Adults do not usually need to be immunized even if they have no "history" of the disease, he said.

"Especially in the face of that recent epidemic, children vaccinated before 1970, and any persons uncertain about their immunization history should be vaccinated."

Hernandez emphasized that parents should have children vaccinated before cases of the disease show up. Measles vaccination is free of charge at local health departments.
