## To observe Pentecost

Members of the First Christian Church of Carlisle will observe Pentecost, the Feast of Weeks (also known as Harvest) on Sunday, May 29. Sunday School will be held at 10 a.m., and the Holy Communion will be held at 11 a.m. at the site of the old Concord Church at 10:45 a.m., with a potluck dinner on the grounds at 12 p.m.

The Feast of Weeks is the traditional anniversary of the birth of the church as recorded in the second chapter of the book of Acts. It is also the anniversary of the receipt of the Law, by Moses (Torah—Hebrew), it being seven weeks after Passover and/or Easter.

The old Cane Ridge meeting house was erected in 1791. The old Concord Church was erected about the same time and Barton W. Stone became the minister for both churches, with morning services at Cane Ridge and afternoon services at Concord, just a horseback ride apart.

In May, 1801, a great revival was held at Concord with 6,000 people in attendance. This meeting was the prelude to the Cane Ridge revival of August of that year, with more than 30,000 people in attendance, according to Roger Womack.

The First Christian Church, Disciples of Christ, Carlisle, is the direct descendant and result of the two revivals, for it was here the Christian Church was born, with the additional name, Disciples of Christ being added during the movements of Barton W. Stone and Alexander Campbell were joined in 1828, which was in 1832, Womack said.
