Spraying young plants before transplanting may revolutionize agriculture

A University of Kentucky chemical researcher in the College of Plant Pathology of the Department of Agriculture has developed a simple, logical idea into a process that may revolutionize agriculture.

Kuc and UK researchers have successfully immunized fruit trees, potatoes, watermelons, mushrooms, green beans and cucumbers against diseases. They have demonstrated the immunizations under field conditions with cucumbers, watermelons and mushrooms.

Immunization, Kuc points out, has long been the basis of preventive medicine in man and animals. His immunization of plants follows the same model: that is, he grows plants with some form of the pathogen that causes a given disease, thus triggering their own defenses.

How does it feel to be blind? FRANKFORT—How does it feel to suddenly lose the ability to see? "I felt that I could live with the physical limitations, if I could ever learn to accept it emotionally," says Charles McDowell, director of the Bureau for the Blind.

It was three years later that McDowell finally accepted his blindness. "The superintendent of the school finally got through to me," said McDowell. "I realized later that I was not living up to my potential."
