

Safety grant awarded State Police

FRANKFORT—The Kentucky State Police has been awarded a \$30,000 federal highway safety grant, according to Transportation Secretary Calvin G. Grayson.

The grant will be used to supply uniform citation books to each police agency and to provide instruction for police officers in the proper use of the uniform citations.

Seashore barley cops survive salty irrigation

WASHINGTON—"Water, water, everywhere for my drop to drink," goes Samuel Coleridge's lament about the sea in "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner." Not any drop for crops, a

farmer might add. But two scientists at the University of California at Davis have found a way to use water that is so salty that it would be considered unusable for drinking. About four years ago they set out to solve a problem nearly as old as the

sea: how to grow crops in a salty soil. Neither the cold weather nor the muddy field stopped the Nicholas County Bluejackets from soundly defeating the Maysville Bulldogs 29-0 last Friday night here.

"We really played super," said Coach Ben Pumphrey after Friday night's game, "and we'll also play well this week."

The Jackets controlled the game from the start. After Tim Moreland's opening kickoff to Maysville which landed on the Jacket 47 yard line, the Bulldogs soon found out. In their following three plays, that moving the ball against a strong Nicholas County defense was no easy task. On their fourth-down play, Maysville had to punt. Joe Russell returned the punt to the Maysville 30 yard line. On the Jacket's first play Clifford Thompson took the ball and ran 70 yards for a touchdown. Moreland's extra-point kick was no good, leaving the score 6-0

at the end of the first quarter. Neither team scored in the second quarter, but after halftime was over, a prepared Nicholas County team came out to overwhelm Maysville 29-0 last Friday night here.

Thompson returned the Bulldog's kick-off 23 yards, placing the Bluejackets on their own 40 yard line. Thompson gained four yards, Randy Hunter then followed by Thompson carrying again for a one-yard gain. On fourth down, Joe Russell missed a 36-yard punt for another touchdown. There was a bad snap on the extra-point attempt and again Moreland's kick failed. Midway through the third quarter, Joe Russell completed a six-yard pass for another score to Timmy Ockerman. Moreland's extra-point kick was good making the score 14-0 at the end of the quarter.

In the beginning of the fourth quarter, Joe Russell's 89 yard run put the ball on the Maysville 20 yard line. The Jackets were unable to move the ball, however;

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Emergency livestock feed program assigned

On Thursday, Sept. 29, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) was assigned responsibility for an Emergency Livestock Feed and Drought Assistance program under the 1977 farm bill signed by President Carter. Under the program, eligible producers may be reimbursed for up to 50 percent of the cost of feed purchased for their livestock.

The program will be administered by USDA's Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) through the farmer-elected county committees. Individual farmer eligibility will be determined on a case-by-case basis by these committees with no emergency designation from Washington required before the program goes into effect in a county.

Previously, ASCS administered a similar program but received mission assignments from Federal Disaster Assistance Administration, an agency of the Department of Housing and Urban Development. According to USDA spokesmen, the new program should result in better service to farmers since program decisions will be made at the county level rather than in Washington. Further, the new program can go into effect on individual farms, the program can provide assistance when only a few farms in a county have been affected by natural disaster.

Producers who have already received approval for emergency drought assistance are urged to contact their county ASCS office to see if any adjustments may be required under the new law. Requests for designation made after 7:30 p.m. Eastern Standard Time will be automatically transferred to ASCS for action.
