Mayor Power wins seventh term

Mayor Bill Power has won his seventh term as Mayor of the City of Carlsie by defeating his closest opponent Lee Bents by 111 votes. Mayor Power received 263 votes to Mr. Bents' 222 votes. Other candidates in the Mayor's race were Clifton Waugh 66 votes, and Veach Berry 61 votes.

The Constitutional Convention question last by an overwhelming 965-137 vote margin in Nicholas County.

Four incumbent Councilmen and two newcomers won the six city council seats. Incumbent Councilman Bob Paul was defeated, but received 277 votes. Incumbent councilmen who were re-elected are: Charles Fay 411, Alex Crawford 391, Julian Green 420, and Clarence Carl 392. Carl Sparks with 428 votes and Franklin Hughes with 346 votes were the two new councilmen elected. Bobby Baratti was the other council candidate who lost with 282 votes.

In the 1st and 2nd Justice of the Peace races, both Democratic candidates defeated their Republican opponents. In the 1st District, Melvin Fryman defeated Jimmy Wells 148-100. In the 2nd District, the only present Magistrate to win the May Primary, defeated Herbert L. McCarahan 202-134.

The unopposed candidates who were elected, and their vote tallies, may be found listed on page 3 of today's Mercury.

Only a total of 1602 persons voted in this election, compared to 2460 votes in November, 1976.

U.S. BOND SALES

ASCS mails burley marketing cards

Burley Tobacco Marketing cards were mailed by the local ASCS Office to Nicholas County Producers on Oct. 28.

A few marketing cards are being held in the ASCS office for producers to pick up because of missing information. The card must remain in custody of the warehouse until payment is made or until their tobacco is removed from the warehouse (except where a card is needed by owner or operator to effect a transfer of quota).

Producers must pick up their marketing card from the warehouse at the time payment for the tobacco is received. Producers must examine their marketing card and sale bills after each sale to see if the sale was correctly recorded. Report any error to the ASCS Marketing recorder at the warehouse or to the local county ASCS office.
