Employees of Blue Grass Industries will be eligible to donate Oct. 10 because the next drawing at BGI will not be until Jan. 11 separating the eight-week period of waiting before a person can donate again. Persons who are 66 years of age or older or those who cannot donate blood because of previous illnesses, such as hepatitis, blood diseases, heart diseases, epilepsy, etc., can be a member of the Nicholas County Blood Donor Group plan if they have an eligible person donate for them and tell the blood donor clerk for whom they are donating. These people will then have all the privileges the actual donors have. Persons needing a ride Monday are asked to call the Carlisle United Methodist Church, 280-240, at least one hour before their appointment so that transportation can be arranged. The importance of this project, sponsored by the Nicholas County Ministerial Association, cannot be over-emphasized, Rev. Kammage said. "The life you save may be your own". Tomorrow may be too late. Unless blood is available—that is given, processed and ready for transfusion before an emergency occurs—you or one of your loved ones may die because you put off until tomorrow what you should have done today. So call and make your appointment, he urged.

To reach the goal of 100 pints of blood, eight donors will be needed every 15 minutes. Jesus tells us: "Love your neighbor as yourself." Scripture also tells us that we are our brother's keeper. So make your appointment now, be returned. If, during the coming year you need blood or have any questions concerning being charged for blood or whatever, contact your minister or call Rev. Kammage, 280-260, for details and answers.

## Dr. Eslie Asbury to be honor guest

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While deeply involved in his medical practice, Dr. Asbury was a frequent contributor to both a medical and thoroughbred trade periodicals. His thoughts on racing and breeding often appeared in the Blood-Horse, Thoroughbred Record and Daily Racing Form.

The University of Cincinnati honored Dr. Asbury in 1963, bestowing upon him the Distinguished Alumnus Award. In 1976, the University of Cincinnati gave him an Honorary Doctorate of Science degree. It was the late A. B. Hancock Sr. who brought Dr. Asbury into the thoroughbred breeding industry. In turn, Dr. Asbury was later encouraged and his farm advised such other newcomers as Lloyd I. Miller, Powell Crisley Jr., William O. Dwyer and Robert Klusner as they invested in the business.
