Lewis County scored midway through the quarter on a 63-yard run by David

Gaunce, son of Donnie Gaunce, a Bluejacket star and presently principal of Lewis County High. Their attempt for the two-point conversion failed after the Jackets' drive to the end of the quarter.

The Lions opened the second quarter with another touchdown on a 23-yard pass-play. Another two-point conversion attempt failed on the half with the Lions on top, 13-4.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, and as the fourth quarter progressed, it looked like things were all over for the Jackets until the light minutes of play. Then Allen Atkinson came through, after the Jacket's recovered a Lewis County fumble, running 9 yards for Nicholas County's first score. Tim Moreland's kick attempt, for the extra point, failed. The Jacket's kickoff rolled out-of-bounds on the Lewis County 40-yard line. Two plays later Ricky Fryman recovered a fumble and the Jacket's were off again to score the final points of the game. Atkinson charged 67 yards for the Nicholas County score. Moreland's extra-point kick was blocked, but an officious penalty against Lewis County gave the Bluejacket's another chance, and Moreland's second kick proved good, making the final score 13-12 in favor of the Jacket's.
