The fall crop of apples seems to be in as great a supply as were the spring and early summer ones. Of course it is hard to really tell when one season of apples comes on and another one leaves behind it because the different kinds of apples. No matter what the season, apples are one of our most useful fruits. They are good for eating raw in numerous ways, from the hard, to salads and desserts, good cooked as apple sauce, in cakes and pies.

APPLE AND SAUSAGE QUICHE
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup chopped apple
Salt and lemon juice
1 small onion, chopped fine
6 pork sausage links
4 eggs
1 pint sour cream
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
Dash of cayenne
9 inch pie shell, baked 10 minutes
Grated parmesan or cheddar cheese
After cooking butter in skillet, add chopped apples after dropping in sugar and a little lemon juice, dash of salt and pepper, and chopped onion. Season until soft, but not mushy. Take off heat and cool for 30 minutes. Then add sausage cut in three pieces each. Cook eggs together with sour cream, nutmeg, cayenne, salt and pepper, add to sausage mixture and turn into the 10

minute baked pie shell and bake 300 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes or until brown on top. Remove from oven. Sprinkle with clean, flaked with small amount of apple halfway through baking time. Cover with foil for 10 minutes and serve in wedges.

NEW ENGLAND APPLE-ROLL
1/4 cup all purpose flour
1/4 cup sour cream
1/4 cup softened butter
1/4 cup milk
1/4 cup butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
2 medium peeled, cored, sliced apples
1/2 tablespoons dark brown sugar
1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
1/4 cup raisins
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup chopped walnuts
Mix flour, sour cream, and butter in mixing bowl, blend well, cover and chill 10 minutes in refrigerator. After cooling butter in skillet, add chopped apples after dropping in sugar and a little lemon juice, dash of salt and pepper, and chopped onion. Season until soft, but not mushy. Take off heat and cool for 30 minutes. Then add sausage cut in three pieces each. Cook eggs together with sour cream, nutmeg, cayenne, salt and pepper, add to sausage mixture and turn into the 10

Roll up pastry cloth gently as you roll, using dough over top. Bake 425 degrees on a greased cookie sheet. Bake 45 degrees for 25 minutes until golden about halfway through baking time. Cool five minutes and remove from pan. Slice when cool. May be served while hot with sauce of your choice.

APPLE PUDDING PIE
1 egg
3/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 cup peeled, cored and chopped apples
3/4 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
In mixing bowl, beat the egg until light. Beat in sugar until well blended. Combine flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon, and sift into egg mixture, starting until well mixed. Stir in apples and nuts. Spoon into a well greased 8 x 9 inch pie pan and smooth top with spatula. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven until top is browned and it springs back when lightly touched, about 45 minutes. Serve warm or cool. If desired, top each wedge with cream or ice cream. Also good served with lemon sauce.

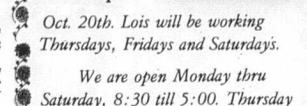

State Police seek help from CB ers

Frankfort — The Kentucky State Police are calling on citizens hand radio operators for help in keeping roadways safe.

In an effort with the Associated Public Safety Communications Officers (APSCO), thousands of calls are being printed and distributed to C. B. clubs and related organizations' advising motorists on how they can assist.

The instructions on the cards tell the C. B. ers what information is needed by the State Police. For example, in an accident situation the card should include any injuries, whether an ambulance has been called; if the road is blocked, and the exact location of "the spot."

Information should be relayed to a local C. B. base station, and the nearest State Police post will be dispatched. C. B. ers for information, and consider them interested citizens who want a better community and are willing to assist.
