



Rev. McNeely to speak at Baptist Church

The Rev. Gerald McNeely, Southern Baptist missionary to Spain and former pastor of First Baptist Church, will be the speaker at the morning worship hour on Sunday, Sept. 4 at 11 a.m. Rev. and Mrs. McNeely were appointed as missionaries to Spain in 1957. It was at this time that Mr. McNeely left the pastorate of the local Baptist Church. It was his ministry that led to the formation and completion of plans to build the present educational building of the First Baptist Church which was dedicated 20 years ago on July 14. Since 1970 Rev. McNeely has been president of the Spanish Baptist Theological Seminary in Madrid, having served on the faculty for 11 years. For

several years the seminary was located in Barcelona and was moved to Madrid in the summer of 1971. Mr. McNeely studied at the U.S. Air Force Academy at Annapolis, Md. He later transferred to Georgetown College where he completed his Bachelor of Arts Degree. He studied at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville where he received his Bachelor of Divinity, and Master of Religious Education Degree. He presently is working on his Doctor of Religious

Students in John Lane's phrase-elastic journalism class are learning how to put together a high school newspaper. The class has been divided into small groups and each group is responsible for gathering and writing news. This news will be submitted to The Carlisle Mercury during the nine-week course. Other projects will include publication of a four-page newspaper. The class is designed to teach young people home management practices, whether they are single or married. The course includes six areas of home economics: foods and nutrition, clothing and textiles, child care, housing, consumer education and management, and relationships. The class, although designed for both sexes, is an attempt to get boys more active in home economics. Creative Housing is being taught for the first time at NCHS by Miss Kathy Green during second semester. The class is designed to be an advance course in housing. Areas covered in the class are interior decorating, types of architecture, and housing styles that will stimulate creative projects for use in the home. There will be several field trips planned during the course. Stu-

dents will prepare a house plan and do various types of projects. Prerequisites for the class are Home Economics I and II. Misses Debbie Shields, April Howard, Tammy Hales, and Michelle Knapp, NCHS majorettes, will be performing a fine feature during the ball-toss show at the NCHS-Bellevue football game this Friday night. The NCHS Marching Band is using a new technique for football shows this year called Drum Corps. The band will perform such selections as "Get Up and Boogie," "Send in the Clowns," and "Yankee Doodle Dandy." Eighteen NCHS students are currently enrolled in the Girl's Child Development Class offered for the second year by Mrs. Eoinne McCallie and Mrs. Martha Taylor. Home Economics teachers. The class is designed to prepare students for employment in a child care center after completion of the class. The students receive two credits for this class which is offered two hours a day. Class instruction consists of learning packets called modules on which the students work at their own pace. During the first semester of class the students work on modules and the second semester she goes to different work centers in the community, including PlaySchool in the Home Economics Department.
