add cream cheese, breaking cheese
into small pieces and stirring into

refrigerator. Add celery and pistachio.
Whipped topping. Refrigerate until set.

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Auto mishaps reported in city and county
Nicholas County Deputy Sheriff J.W. Eton said he investigated a non-injury auto-truck accident about 12:15 p.m. Friday, Sept. 2 on the Moorfield Road. Eton said the auto operated by Hance Mullins of Meade collided with a balance gas truck near the Nicholas-Bath county line. The truck, operated by Jackie D. High, Mr. O'Neil, suffered only minor damage while damage to the Mullins vehicle was considerable. Eton said.

Carlisle Police Chief Allen Karkywine said an auto operated by Bobby Gene Smalley of Route 4 collided with a vehicle operated by Warren R. Caprell, Sept. 1. The mishap took place on West Main Street. Smalley was attempting to cross from the Dairy Queen to the Trust Free, he said. Considerable damage was done to the Smalley auto, but neither party was injured.

Nicholas County Sheriff Reese Smoot said Darrell D. Aldred, Lexington, reversed his auto across the center line on Aug. 31 into the path of a pickup truck operated by Gary McCreel of Route 4. The vehicle, collided in a crash, Smoot said, near the Otis Caswell farm about five miles from Carlisle on 81.

Smoot reported a Nicholas County school bus and a Volkswagen operated by Mrs. Dora Masley of Route 2 collided as they met on a one lane bridge on the East Union Road about 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 30.
