Ky. FB moving ahead with loose-leaf

"This year's program is designed to allow any burley producer the opportunity to try bagging and sheeting, and decide which of these methods he prefers," Wade said.
Wade estimated that some 25 million pounds, or 8 per cent of the total quota, would be sold loose-leaf in Kentucky this year.
Complete details of grading and sales dates are currently being formulated by a 19-member statewide committee of tobacco leaders, according to committee chairman William Barden, and these details will be announced in the near future.

Officials are hoping to market some 4 million pounds of burley in bales and sheets this year, with participation by farmers in all eight burley states. Previous year's experiments, conducted primarily in Kentucky and Tennessee, have shown that growers can save 10 to 15 per cent of their labor costs when they strip and package the burley in loose-leaf form. A recent University of Kentucky report confirmed the labor-saving aspects of loose-leaf marketing for the farmers.
Wade said the recent Burley Council action to oppose this year's loose-leaf sales represents the latest move by groups who "are trying to kill the program." He said the American Farm Bureau had recently endorsed the eight-state sales effort scheduled this year, and said Farm Bureau leadership in Kentucky is preparing to implement the program in the coming weeks.

He repeated that the program's objective is to offer loose-leaf marketing to all burley-producing counties, and all growers who wish to try the new methods. Previously, only a few hundred growers have tried bagging and sheeting, but these program participants have enthusiastically endorsed the new packages.
"Without this educational program, burley producers would not have the opportunity of knowing whether they like or dislike loose-leaf striping," Wade said. "Farm Bureau thinks this is rightfully a decision to be made by growers."

The vegetables are taken from the garden in the Community Center, Mrs. Tedder said. She delivers the vegetables in towns and people in the county usually pick theirs up when they are at the Community Center for senior citizens meals.
"As of last week the following had been harvested: carrots, peppers, kale mustard, about 800 pounds of potatoes, six bushels of beans, 1,500 ears corn, three bushels beets, seven bushels of cucumbers. The tomatoes are just ripening," Mrs. Tedder said. When asked what is done with the surplus, Mrs. Tedder replied, "What surplus? It all disappears as soon as it's picked!"

RULES:

1. Draw bar must not exceed 18 inches in height.
2. Draw bar must be stationary.
3. Drivers must be seated or tractor must be equipped with dead man throttle.
4. Drivers must be able to control tractor at all times.
5. No weight to be added or altered after tractor is weighed in.
6. Tractors must be weighed with driver on.
7. Driver must stay in pulling lane marked off by the officials to be considered in competition for prizes.
8. Official judges decisions will be final.
9. Tractors will be pulled according to weight:
Class #1 801 lbs. to 1000 lbs.
Class #1 500 lbs. and under
Class #2 401 lbs. to 500 lbs.
Class #3 301 lbs. to 400 lbs.
Class #4 201 lbs. to 300 lbs.
10. Any tractor over 1200 lbs. will not be allowed to pull.
11. The Fair Board reserves the right to make minor changes as necessary in each class.
12. Order of pull in each class will be determined by the time weighed in for each class.
13. Tractors must be on rubber tires to be eligible.
14. The pull stops when sled comes to a dead stop or judge stops you for safety reasons.
15. Entry fee is \$3.00 per driver to be at time of weigh in.
16. Drivers with a pass given him at weigh in time will not pay gate admission.
17. After weigh in there will not be any refunds of entry fees.
18. Fair Board not responsible for accidents.
