

ASCS holds ACP development meet to analyze conservation problems

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service held an ACP development meeting recently at the Nicholas County ASCS office located on Main Street. The purpose of the meeting is to identify and analyze conservation problems in the county. The first phase will identify problems and establish priorities. The second phase, to be scheduled later, will develop proposals for the high priority problems.

Representatives from Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Forestry Service, and the State Forestry Department were invited to attend the meeting. Board members of the Nicholas County Soil Conservation District were also invited to participate.

ACP shares with farmers the cost of carrying out measures on their land to help maintain the productive capacity of agriculture. The development group identified and determined a solution to such problems as soil loss, water conservation, woodland preservation and agricultural pollution. Consideration was given to public benefits, the degree of farmer participation, the need to reduce agricultural pollution to meet water quality standards, and the location of funds for cost-sharing.

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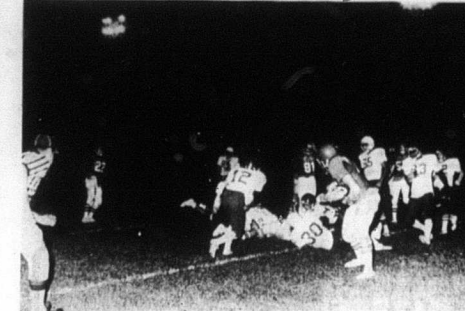
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Jackets win another 52-19
