all committees reporting their findings and its newly appointed delegates from each legislative district to swell the number of participants. One political writer described it as the crowning of a massive lobby for the program the Governor may propose. Committee members who have worked without pay for almost a year do not feel like lobbyists.

Also attending for Kentuckians' attention, shortly after the Task Force adjourns, counties and cities will choose new officials, and decide whether or not to call a convention to amend our 1892 constitution.

On the national scene, President Carter signs a new treaty with Panama, the first treaty concerning the canal since American Secretary of State, John Hay, and Philippe Bunau-Villars, a Luxembourgish French engineer, signed the original treaty on the afternoon of November 18, 1903. At the time of that signing, no Panamanian had seen the treaty even in draft form and no Panamanian was present at the signing. For most of the past 74 years, Panama has been tried to have the treaty revoked.

Now it remains to be seen if two-thirds of the Senate will ratify the newly signed instrument. Governor Carroll briefly by the administration, is arguing for its approval and Senator Blackburn proposes to vote for it. Senator Ford reports his mail is running 7 to 3 against ratification and he must decide whether to support the administration which has rallied such respect and knowledgeable people as John Sherman Cooper to its cause.

Governor Melvin Thornton of New Hampshire characterizes the treaty signing as "America's second day of infamy" and ordered flags on all state buildings flown at half mast, a tribute last used by Governor Carroll of Kentucky to commemorate the tragic loss of life at the Beverly Hills Supper
