Four local persons attend ADD seminar

The panel discussion centered around the purposes, operations and problems of Local Board of Zoning Adjustment (LBA) and presentations were made by Dale Wright, City and ZEA attorney from Lawrenceburg; Jenny Given, Zoning Enforcement Officer from Versailles; and Don Burnett, BGADD District Planning Officer.

"Everybody agreed that the meeting had been informative and educational," said Mr. Burnett, who helped coordinate the seminar. "We at the BGADD think it is important to provide technical training for appointed of-

ficials and interested citizens, especially when it concerns growth and the future of their communities."

Mr. Burnett said that the success of the BGADD's first workshop has prompted the organization to hold a second one (to be scheduled soon) that will deal with various aspects of the changing legislation to come before Kentucky's General Assembly in January.

Waterfowl season unchanged

FRANKFORT—The 1977-78 waterfowl hunting season as set by the Fish and Wildlife Commission will be virtually unchanged from last year's season, Fish and Wildlife Commissioner Arnold Mitchell said. The dates and limits are subject, however, to final approval from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service since the framework for the Mississippi Flyway, of which Kentucky is a part, had not been received in the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources offices at the time of the commissioner's meeting.

As approved by the commission the 79-day statewide goose hunting season will open, 12 and continue through Jan. 20, with the 48-day season for ducks, coots and mergansers split into two parts, Nov. 18-27 and Dec. 16-19. Gallinule hunting will be permitted Nov. 12 through Jan. 20.

The daily bag limit for geese will be five and may include no more than two Canada geese or two whooping cranes, one of each. The possession limit, also five, may include no more than four Canada and whooping cranes, the aggregate of which not more than two may be whooping cranes.

The duck limits will again be based on the point system and the daily bag will be reached when the point value of the last duck taken added to the sum of the points of ducks already taken during that day reaches or exceeds 100 points. The possession limit is the maximum number of ducks of those species and sexes which could have been taken in two days.

Point values are: 100, canvasback; 70, hen mallard, black duck, wood duck, hooded merganser, redhead; 10, pintail, blue-winged, green-winged and cinnamon teal, gadwall, whistling, scaup and other mergansers; 25, drake mallard and all other species. For coots and gallinules, the daily limit is 10, the possession limit 30.

Goose hunting will open on the Ballard County Wildlife Management Area Dec. 1 and continue through Jan. 20 and duck hunting will begin there Dec. 10 and run through Jan. 14. Statewide limits will apply to the Ballard Area, Mitchell said requests for reservations should be sent to the Ballard Co. Wildlife Mgt. Area, Route 1, LaCenter, Ky. 42606 and must be postmarked no earlier than Sept. 15 and no later than Sept. 30. Each request must include the names and addresses of all hunters in a party, a first and alternate choice of hunting dates; a fee of \$5 per day per hunter or \$15 per pet (only cashier's checks, certified checks or money orders accepted); preference for duck or goose hunting and a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

In other action, the Fish and Wildlife Commission approved the organization of one Junior Conservation Club per county for seventh, eighth and ninth grade students, with the new "clubs" to be in addition to the classes already held for 4th and sixth graders in schools throughout the state.
