

# Opinion Voters to decide

Kentucky voters will be asked Nov. 10 to decide whether or not to call a constitutional convention for the purpose of revising the 1892 Constitution. The 1960 attempt was close, but the voters of the constitutional convention held 17,000 short of that needed to call the convention.

The number of votes needed to call the convention is determined by the Constitution. It states that one-fourth of the total number of votes cast in the last statewide election must be cast in a referendum favoring the call of a constitutional convention. With 1,046,000 votes cast in the November 1976 general election, the constitutional call will require 261,500 votes for the purpose of amending the 1892 Constitution to begin.

Subsequently a Citizens' Committee was formed to try to find a doctor who would like to practice in Carlele.

There are many more positions available for doctors than there are doctors graduating. Therefore, something to be done by our community to make a doctor choose Carlele as a place to live over other city. We have many of these desirable attractions already—churches, good schools, new hospital under construction, nursing home, country club, Lake Carlele, and so on with all everyone else in the community. 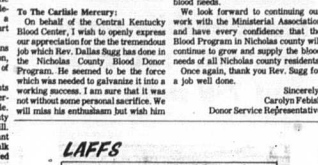
