Constitutional Convention information seminar set

Mrs. Marshall Stone of Carlisle has been named 1977 Arthritis Chairman for Nicholas County. The appointment was made by the Executive Committee of the Arthritis Foundation. The local campaign is scheduled for the month of October with a goal of \$700.

The Arthritis Foundation is the only voluntary agency working in the field of Arthritis which affects over 21,000,000 Americans. Arthritis, the country's Number One crippling disease, actually is a variety of diseases. The cruelest, most severe type is Rheumatoid Arthritis, which afflicts some 5 million people. Two variations, one sudden and violent in its attack and the other relatively mild, strikes children in the form known as Juvenile Rheumatoid Arthritis. Juvenile Rheumatoid Arthritis is now recognized as the fourth major cause of crippling in America.



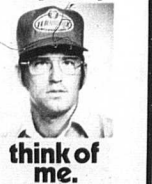

Head Start program funded

FRANKFORT—Gov. Julian M. Carr and Secretary for Human Resources Peter D. Cox have announced that the Community Action Agency of Lexington-Payette County, Lexington, will receive a federal grant of \$20,837 to provide a full-year, part-day Head Start program for 300 children. Nicholas county has 46 of the 200 children registered in its Head Start Program. Head Start programs provide preschool training for children from low-income families. Under federal guidelines, these programs also provide nutritional, medical, social and dental services the children might require. A portion of the grant will support special services for handicapped children.

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TERMINIX Member of Lexington

A seminar to provide information on the question of holding a constitutional convention in Kentucky will be conducted at 1 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 7 at the Lexington Center.

Through a grant from the Kentucky Humanities Council, the Legislative Research Commission is conducting the seminars in September and October to generate public awareness of the pros and cons of the question which appears on the November ballot.

The questions to be addressed at each seminar are: Is there a need for

revision of Kentucky's Constitution at this time? Does the revision process provide sufficient safeguards for protecting the basic rights of Kentuckians and the basic framework of our state government?

The three panels for the Lexington debate will include: Gibson Downing, Lexington, speaking in favor of a constitutional convention; Joseph Leary, Frankfort, speaking against the question; and Malcolm Jewell, the University of Kentucky, will be the academic panelist.

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Gov. Julian Carr will be the featured speaker at Memorial Friday, Sept. 30, when Dr. Morris L. Norfleet is inaugurated as the eighth president of Morehead State University. Gov. Carr's address is scheduled during the 10:30 a.m. inaugural ceremony in Bolton Auditorium. The program is open to the public. Dr. Norfleet, 61, will receive the President's Medallion, symbol of his office, from Lloyd Cassidy, chairman of the MSU Board of Regents. The week will be administered by Judge Eljah M. Hogg of the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

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Nicholas goes to air to defeat Class AAA Jessamine 22-6

Nicholas County had to go to the air to defeat Class AAA Jessamine County 22-6 here Friday night.

"We played really well," said Coach Ben Pumphrey. "The Colts were really tough."

The Jessamine County defense effectively shut off the blue-jacket running game, so Nicholas County resorted to the pass to maintain their number one rating in Class A competition.

The Colts, coached by Nicholas County Alum Frank Coopers, got off to a speedy start, by scoring a touchdown in the beginning of the first quarter on Wayne Richardson's 30 yard pass to the wide receiver.

Nicholas County came back to score their first touchdown also in the first quarter. Allen Atkinson plowed three yards for the score a few plays after Ben Hoover recovered a Col's fumble on the Col's 20 yard line. Tim Moreland's extra-point kick was good, leaving the Jackets ahead 7-0 at the end of the quarter.

The Jackets also scored in the second quarter, with a five-yard pass from Joe Huddell to Gary Williams. The pass came a few plays after the Colts punted out of bounds on their 34 yard line.

A pass interference call against Jessamine helped move the ball into scoring position. There was a penalty on the extra-point attempt, and Jessamine County was penalized half the distance to the goal line for encroachment. Allen Atkinson then plunged one yard for a successful two-point conversion, making the score at the end of the ball 13-7 in favor of Nicholas County.

The Jackets scored on another pass this time for 30 yards, in the middle of the last quarter, from quarterback Joe Huddell to right back Greg Wills. The touchdown shortly followed a Jessamine punt, which was observed on the Col's own 22 yard line. Moreland's extra point kick was good, leaving the final score 22-6, with the Jackets winning their sixth straight game.

Nicholas County's offensive leader was Allen Atkinson who ran the ball 13 times for 34 yards. Randy Hunter was next, running the ball nine times for 22 yards.

"Our offense and especially our defense, played the best game," said Pumphrey.

And that seemed to be the case, with Ben Hoover leading the Jacket defense with 13 tackles and one recovered fumble. Dwight Williams followed with eight tackles, and one recovered fumble. Kevin Gilkison was next with seven, Mark Huddell had six, Rudy Randolph had five, and Mike Berry had four.

Allen Atkinson also recovered a fumble.

Nicholas County will play their last home game Friday night at 8 p.m. against Bath County. This will be the Jacket's homecoming, and special activities for halftime have been planned.

There will also be a dance, sponsored by the Student Council, following the game. Coach Jockey Eric Stephens, WLAP radio station, will provide the music.

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
