Mr. Robey was an All-American at Brother Martin High School in New Orleans, La., a 1977 All-Southeastern Conference selection, and a 1978 All-American candidate. Yousters in Eastern Kentucky between six and 14 will have the opportunity to participate in the national reading motivational program in April. It improves their reading skills and at the same time helps in the search to find the cause and cure of multiple sclerosis, a neurological disease that, together with related diseases, affects an estimated 600,000 Americans. Because of the educational value of the program, school participation is readily available. Once the child registers for the program, he or she receives a kit for listing sponsors and books. The "Mystery Sleuth" then approaches parents, relatives, friends or neighbors and asks them to be sponsors. They make pledges for each book the child reads during a given four-week period. College warm-up course offered for graduating seniors

RICHMOND — High school seniors graduating this spring can jog into college atmosphere in a special program at Eastern Kentucky University June 26-Aug. 4. The College Warm-Up will offer the high school graduates seven college credit hours prior to their freshman year, according to Dr. James K. Libbey, director of the program. He said the College Warm-Up will offer the students foundation courses in English composition, rapid reading and study skills, and orientation before they attempt the first full semester of college. Dr. Libbey said, "Students will be given academic and vocational counseling, as well as the opportunity to develop skills and habits necessary for the successful completion of a college course." Information about enrolling in the College Warm-Up may be obtained from Dr. Libbey, who is an assistant professor in the Department of Learning Skills, or from the office of Dr. Joseph Schwendeman, Dean of Undergraduate Studies. Registration will begin at 9 a.m. in the Ferrell Room of the Bert Combs Building, June 26.
