Employees' stress conference April 10-12

FRANKFORT — A conference designed to show employees and labor leaders how to help employees deal with alcoholism, drug abuse and emotional stress is scheduled for April 10-12 at Louisville's Executive Inn West.

The conference is sponsored by the state APT-DO, Associated Industries of Kentucky, Alcoholism Council in Louisville and the Association of Labor-Management Administrators and Consultants on Alcoholism (ALMACA).

According to John Brand, human resources' occupational programs officer, the conference is geared to managers, labor leaders, supervisory personnel, shop stewards and personnel officers. "They will be offered an organized approach to identifying employees whose job performance is affected by alcoholism and other problems," said Brand.

In this program, he said, employees and supervisors do not "accuse, diagnose or counsel" employees. They see the problem and follow one of a number of different methods to find help for the employees.

Many major industries and corporations in the United States are using this approach and have reported favorable results, including reduced absenteeism, fewer on-the-job accidents, reductions in insurance claims, and increases in efficiency, job stabilization and employee satisfaction, Mr. Brand said.

Mr. Brand calls the approach beneficial to management and taxpayers, too. "Through welfare programs, the government spends a lot of money on people after they lose their jobs and other treatment is needed, at government expense," he said. "This program helps men and women solve their problems before their problems cost them their jobs and, we hope, before they become severe."

The conference workshop leaders represent agencies and businesses in Minnesota, Massachusetts, Ohio and North Carolina. Also scheduled are presentations by Kentucky representatives of General Electric, Ashland Oil, AFL-CIO and the Jefferson County Health Department.

The conference begins at 10 a.m. Monday, April 10, and ends at noon April 12. The \$35 fee includes a Tuesday evening banquet.
