Carlisle All Kentucky City again

Carlisle was one of only nine cities in the state named an "All Kentucky City" by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, April 4. The announcement was made following a luncheon in Louisville attended by some 800 community leaders from all across the state.

Carlisle's delegation accepting the award at the luncheon included Carolyn Dotson, home economist for Kentucky Utilities, the person responsible for writing the entry, Mayor Bill Power, County Judge/Executive Teece Snook, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Fisher, Mrs. Jack Conley, Mrs. Walter Kendall, Mike Phillips, Paul Snow, Paul Ramsey, David Tison, David Wilson, Dudley Vaughn and Jimmy Carter.

Mrs. Dotson, KU home economist for Carlisle, Paris, Cynthiana, and Winchester areas, compiled and authored Carlisle's winning written presentation. Recently elected president of the Nicholas County Elementary PTA, she was honored on March 29 by the local Future Homemakers of America (FHA) by being named an honorary member of FHA.

Mrs. Dotson is a native of Campbell County and a graduate of Nicholas County High School and Morehead State University. She received her degree in 1970 in vocational home economics.

She is vice-president of the Paris Business and Professional Women's Club, and a member of the Marie Chapter O.E.S.

She and her husband, Teddy M. Dotson, have a daughter, Mary Susan. They reside at 221 North Street in Carlisle.

Mrs. Wendell Kingsolver took Mrs. Dotson's written entry and prepared and narrated the 15 minute slide presentation required by the judges. The "All Kentucky City" program was initiated in 1963 and recognizes those communities that have demonstrated outstanding community development for the past year. Sixty-four communities participated in this year's program with 40 advancing to the state finals held in January. Those judged as finalists included Ashland, Bardonia, Beaver Dam, Berea, Blountsville, Carlisle, Carrollton, Covington, Cumberland, Dunville, Earlinton, Elizabethtown, Flemingburg, Fulton, Georgetown, Glasgow, Greensburg, Harrodsburg, Hartford, Henderson, Hickman, Horse Cave, Irvine/Ravenna, Liberty, Marion, Maysville, Middletown, Morehead, Morganfield, Mt. Vernon, Owensboro, Pionville, Richmond, Russellville, Shelbyville, Somerset, Versailles, Warsaw, Wilmore, and Winchester.

Those receiving certificates of excellence are Beattyville, Campbellville, Columbia, Edyville, Eminence, Gretnville, Hodgenville, Lawrenceburg, Lebanon, Radcliff, and Sturgis. Those receiving the "All Kentucky City" award include Carlisle, Elizabethtown, Ashland, Covington, Hartford, Harrodsburg, Richmond, Henderson, and Elizabethtown. Special recognition was given to three Kentucky communities who have won the award in the past five or less years. Those cities receiving the "Hall of Fame" award are Harrodsburg, Richmond, and Henderson.

A new award was added this year to recognize that community which has continued to show extraordinary progress in community development. The award, signed by the Vice President of the United States, Walter Mondale, was awarded this year to Elizabethtown. It is the "Presidential Classic" award. Elizabethtown has won the "All Kentucky City" designation nine times. A recipient of the "All Kentucky City" award in 1967, 1968, 1970, 1971, 1972, 1974, 1975, 1976 and again in 1977, Elizabethtown was judged one of the top three reporting communities at the January judging, making Elizabethtown eligible for the highest award.
