Driving permits for 15½ year olds not to become law

In the legislative session wrap-up issued by Public Information, our summary of bills passed included references to certain provisions of Senate Bill 114, a bill that was the subject of several conference committee meetings on the final day of the 1978 General Assembly.
One provision of the bill which the summary said had passed, driving permits for 15½-year-olds, actually was omitted from the conference report on SB 114 that finally received the legislature's approval, and will therefore not become law.

In that same report, certain technical errors were made regarding the adoption of four-year driver licenses. To acknowledge the errors and fulfill the legislature's intent to adopt the license, the conference chairman and staff have signed affidavits to that effect. Thus, the four-year licenses will become law until a court acts upon the legality of the measure.

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Use your directory

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look at the beginning of that particular letter section. For example, G. Metal Shop would be the first listing under the "G" section. G. A. Auto Shop would be next.
— A name can be under initials or under a nickname. Bill could be William. Jane could be J. R. Initials precede first names. Smith, J. would come before Smith, John.
— If a business has a two-word name, the listing appears in alphabetical order under the first word. For example, Bay Ridge Diner comes before Beyer Wood Co.
"Keeping these tips in mind can help you find number in the directory," Mr. Harris said. "And similar tips are listed in the Call Guide section in front of your telephone book, too."
"The Call Guide section also has emergency service numbers. And there is a reminder to take your directory with you when you move to save time and money in calling friends back home," Mr. Harris said.
"We've included an Easy Reference List of government offices and other public services in the front of the directory to aid you," Mr. Harris said. "This list includes everything from post offices to health associations to tax information to flood protection."
"You'll also find a Quick List on the back of your phone book where you can list important numbers," he said. "And we'll be glad to send you a small, personal directory for use in jotting down frequently-called numbers."
"We realize there are times when a call to directory assistance is necessary," he said. "That's why your basic service includes a five-call allowance."
"But experience with similar plans in other states shows that the vast majority of people are never charged for directory assistance," he said. "In fact, in Cincinnati, where a similar directory-assistance plan has been in effect for three years, 94 per cent of the subscribers have avoided charges in any given month since the plan began. You can keep your telephone bill down, too, by looking up numbers in the directory," Mr. Harris said.
