Southern States Cooperative holds meeting

J. S. Wilson of Morefield and Tommy Ockerman of Carlisle were elected to the local Advisory Board at the Southern States Annual Membership meeting held in Carlisle on Aug. 1. Over 400 stockholder-members and their families attended the session. Samuel Reynolds of Carlisle was named chairman of the local board, while Kenneth Stephens of Carlisle was chosen as a delegate to represent the local membership at the Southern States Cooperative's 50th Annual Stockholders Meeting to be held in November. James W. Platt of Carlisle was named alternate.

Elected as delegates and alternate to a District Election meeting to be held in October this fall, was S. S. Lyons of Carlisle named as delegate and Jerry Taber of Carlisle named as alternate. Representatives from IRS and Social Security Administration will be on hand to point out the advantages and procedures for filing documents by magnetic means (tape, disk, diskette). Simon-Kenton relates battle to Clark

(Editor's note: Kyle Allison, a local resident known in these parts for his avid interest in history submitted this article as a historical remembrance of the attack on Bryan Station and the feelings of Simon Kenton after finding his army defeated. The battle took place about this time 96 years ago.)

August 20, 1782
Simon Kenton's voice was nearly breaking as he told Clark the rest of the story. He himself had been at Logan-Fort. Starved when word came of the attack on Bryan's Station. Logan gathered 470 men and Kenton as captain of one of the companies, they rode hard. On reaching Bryant's, they learned that Todd's party had already been gone a day and without hesitation they followed.

In the early morning light of the day after battle, August 20, they crossed the fort and viewed with sick horror the defeated army. The bodies were still being gathered and brought to a central location and an unspeakable rage and sorrow filled Simon as he was stretched out in death of the faces of so many friends and companions: John Todd, one of the first to be killed, lay beside the body of Stephen Trigg. Only Boone, of the three principal officers survived although he was wounded, and his own

Board acts on absences, sick leave

Excused absences and sick leave were among the topics acted upon Aug. 2 at a meeting of the Nicholas County Board of Education.

The policy of allowing students up to 10 days excused absence for harvesting tobacco was re-approved for this school year. The policy was also in effect last school year.

Board policy was amended to give classified (non-certified) personal three sick leave days annually over the limiting and continuing contract to specify a designated term of employment. This was taken to bring the board's policies in line with new unemployment compensation legislation.

Under the old board policy, not only in Nicholas County but across the state, some teachers were eligible under existing guidelines and programs have been amended since then, although some Kentucky teachers received unemployment compensation for the summers of 1975 and 1976.

In other business the board approved sick and/or maternity leave for Bonnie McMillan from Sept. 12 to Nov. 20, accepted the resignation of Ellen Martin as remedial math teacher and approved the following list of substitute bus drivers:

• Also approved were motions allowing the East Union School alumni to hold their annual reunion Aug. 28 at the elementary school, moving the September board meeting from Sept. 2 to Sept. 9, allowing the cheerleaders use of a bus to travel to cheerleader camp at Eastern Kentucky University Aug. 6 and return on Aug. 19 with Annette Flera driving and approving the request of the Delta Dental Plan to offer their contract to the state's students as an option.

Local farmer delegate to small farms conference

Matthew Kennedy, who lives on the Dog Walk Road in Nicholas County, has just returned from Montgomery, Ala., where he was a delegate to the Southeast Regional Small farms conference. In addition to Kentucky and Alabama, other states represented were Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia, and Puerto Rico. The conference in Montgomery is only one of five being held across the United States which is being cosponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Community Services Administration (CSA). Incidentally, however, the Southeast Region encompasses approximately 40 per cent of the small farmers in the Nation.

The purpose of these conferences is to provide truly small farm operators an opportunity to identify problems that are important to their farm operations and identify needed improvements of present programs.
