He reported that total volume for their operation for the past year was about \$90,000. His report included the use of a number of color slides showing the co-op's present service as well as pictures of patron's farming operations.

son Israel had been killed. And there was Simon's former fellow spy and companion Silas Harlan and the Bulger brothers, Major Edward and Captain John. Here too were Captains Clough Overton and John Beasley, Joe Kincaid and John Gordon, Bill Givins and John Kennedy, James McGire and Barrett Rogers and pleasant little Thomas Hinkson. And the man who had been to blame for it all (Hugh McCarty) had emerged unscathed.

Simon passed, unable for the moment to continue, his head bowed and seeing again in his mind's eye the terrible picture of violent death that had overtaken 70 men, good men all of them, men who had done much to help carve Kentucky County out of the wilderness.

At length he raised his head and continued. He had stayed to help bury the men, these friends of many years standing, and then he had ridden here to Louisville to Clark. Would the General mount an expedition to go against the Shawnees in the same villages of Chillicothe and Popo Town his army destroyed two years ago? General George Rogers Clark would.
