TOMATO-CUCUMBER MARINADE
2 tomatoes, peeled and sliced
1 medium cucumber, peeled, and thinly sliced
1/2 medium sweet onion, peeled, thinly sliced and separated into rings
1/4 cup salad oil
1/4 cup wine vinegar
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon basil
1/2 teaspoon sugar, optional
Pepper
Shredded lettuce
Alternate layers of tomato, cucumber, and onion in shallow glass dish. Combine salad oil, vinegar, basil, sugar, and pepper; beat with rotary beater and pour over layered vegetables; chill covered, 3 or 4 hours. Drain, reserving marinade. Arrange marinated vegetables on shredded lettuce. Pass reserved marinade.

HOT STUFFED TOMATOES
6 medium tomatoes
1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup milk
1 slightly beaten egg yolk
2 tablespoons margarine, melted
1 10-ounce package frozen chopped spinach, cooked and well drained
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 teaspoon seasoned salt
1/4 cup burgundy
Pepper
Chopped parsley
Core tomatoes; cut in on or 1/4 inch slices in large salad, melt margarine, stir in brown sugar and seasoned salt. Add tomato slices and cook quickly on both sides. Add salt; simmer 1 to 2 minutes or until tomatoes are heated through. Heat for five minutes. Sprinkle with pepper and parsley. Serve in sauce dishes with a spoon or two of the sauce. This is a nice way to serve the tomato.

BURGUNDY-GLAZED TOMATOES
4 large tomatoes
4 tablespoons margarine
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 teaspoon seasoned salt
1/4 cup burgundy
Pepper
Chopped parsley

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Import arrangements made for world championships

Lexington — The Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) of the U. S. Department of Agriculture has approved the temporary importation of the Greater Cincinnati Airport, located in Florence and the Paine-Tipton Kentucky Newsprint Paddock in Lexington as part of entry and quarantine facilities for horses scheduled to enter the United States to compete in the World Three-Day Event Championships at the Kentucky Horse park here Sept. 14-17.

APHIS Deputy Administrator Dr. Pierre Chaloux endorsed the action July 26 on special authority provided under Chapter 1, Section 81 of Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, which outlines rules governing the importation of animals to the U. S.
Dr. James B. Hallway Jr., president of Equestrian Events, Inc., the organizing committee for the World Championships on behalf of the American Horse Shows Association, the national equestrian federation of the United States, stated, "The approval by USDA of the request for temporary port of entry and quarantine in Kentucky will assure that the rigorous training schedules of foreign horses coming to this important international event will not be interrupted by forced immobility and extra travel from the main USDA quarantine facility in Clifton, N. J. Under this arrangement, we can be assured that these horses will be able to maintain their competitive condition and perform at their peak during the World Three-Day Event Championships."
Approximately 21 of the anticipated 44 competing horses are expected to enter the U. S. under the temporary import arrangement. World Championship Director Edith Covert estimated the savings in extra transportation costs at \$60,000 to \$100,000. In a related move, the U. S.

Department of Agriculture has proposed an amendment to USDA/APHIS regulations that will no longer require certain horses eligible for import into the United States to be quarantined at USDA facilities.
Dr. Chaloux indicated the change in import regulations will permit horses to be imported to the U. S. at any international port of entry if a quarantine facility has been provided by the importer. Plans for the facilities will have to be approved in advance by the office of the APHIS Deputy Administrator and be inspected by a USDA official to assure that they comply with specific requirements as to location, construction, sanitation, security and operational procedure.
The proposed amendment was published in the Aug. 2 Federal Register, with a 15-day comment period. This action by USDA will allow horses to arrive as close as possible to their final destination, thus alleviating the stress of additional transportation, interruption of training schedules, extra costs and loss of time. The amendment establishes criteria for arrangements similar to those made in Kentucky under special authority.

The World Three-Day Event Championships are an Olympic-level competition held on the even year between the Olympic Games. Horses perform in three disciplines — dressage, speed and endurance (including a demanding cross-country jumping test) and show jumping. The U. S. is hosting these championships for the first time through the good Media-winning individual and team performances of Pennsylvania Bruce Davidson and the U. S. Equestrian Three-Day Event Team in the 1974 World Championships held in Burlington, England.
