 grade loss raises as comparable grades of hand-tied leaf.  
 The loose-leaf program in line with an earlier recommendation from the Council for Burley Tobacco, an organization representing growers, warehousemen, manufacturers and dealers. Kentucky Farm Bureau also strongly supported the proposal.  
 Basically, farmers will be able to apply for a loose-leaf quota equal to 5 per cent of their total quota, or 1,500 pounds, whichever is greater. Special sales days will then be scheduled on auction floors to handle the baled leaf.  
 The purpose of the program, according to its supporters, is to provide a large number of producers the opportunity to try baling as an alternative to marketing burley in hand-tied bundles. Earlier small-scale experiments conducted by the University of Kentucky and Farm Bureau have shown that farmers can save from 25 to 40 per cent of their time and labor costs during stripping by using a loose-leaf package.  
 During a 30-day consent period, which ended Aug. 7, the loose-leaf program drew the support of roughly 67 of every 7 burley growers who wrote letters to the Department of Agriculture.  
 The final tally of letters reaching USDA's Price Support and Loan Division showed 260 farmers favoring the educational program, while 49 growers were opposed. Other letters which stated an opinion, including some from farm organizations, warehouses and other businesses, were more evenly split, with 10 letters favoring, eight letters opposing.  
 Growers were even more solidly in support of setting identical price support loan levels for the bales, which have been suggested for this year's program, and the traditional hand-tied bundles. Of the 215 farmers who stated a position on this issue, 206 said the loan rates should be the same.  
 By contrast, three tobacco companies, including R. J. Reynolds, the nation's largest, told the department the price guarantees on bales should be lower.

## Senator withdraws anti-tobacco bill

WASHINGTON — A tobacco production research program survived a scare when an anti-tobacco senator decided to withdraw an amendment to kill the program.

Senator Claiborne Pell (D-R.I.) withdrew the amendment after receiving assurances from Senators Walter (Doc) Holliston, Wendell Ford, and others that the program provides for research on health-related aspects of tobacco.

The dispute arose during consideration of a \$1 million tobacco research program included in the agriculture appropriations bill. More than \$700,000 of this money goes to the University of Kentucky.

The funds were originally dropped by the Department of Agriculture. They were restored in the House bill, and then added to the Senate bill by

Holliston in the Appropriations Committee.

Pell argued that it was inconsonant for the government to fund research on tobacco production at the same time it is warning smokers of the health hazard. He said the government should not be supporting production of a "cancer-causing substance."

Holliston responded that eliminating the tobacco research program would be counter-productive because much of the research goes toward health-related aspects of tobacco.

"You cannot separate production research from health research because it all involves the content and makeup of the leaf, its genetics and physiological composition — all of which is intimately involved in efforts to produce a safer cigarette," Holliston said.

He quoted from a letter written by Dean Charles Barnhart of the University of Kentucky, who said the research program in question has led to some of the real breakthroughs in health research.

Holliston listed several studies conducted by the University of Kentucky dealing with the smoke content of cigarettes, the effect of berberis on leaf chemistry, and the effect of nicotine on rats during laboratory experiments.

Senator Ford pointed out that the state of Kentucky provides \$1 million annually for health-related tobacco research, and said the University of Kentucky program has been instrumental in development of low tar and nicotine cigarettes.

Despite withdrawal of the amendment, anti-tobacco senators promised a much more thorough look at the program next year. Senator Thomas Eagleton and Henry Bellmon, chairman and ranking minority member of the agriculture appropriations subcommittee, both expressed support for Pell's amendment, and they would explore the program "in great detail" next year.

Eagleton, a smoker who described it as an "obnoxious habit," said he will seek to eliminate money in the program that is not directly related to health in next year's budget.
