Labour Day weekend, probably the last big cook-out of the season, so let's make the most of it. You can grill most of the meats to heating long leaves of bread and grilling saucy vegetables. It's not to mention the old standby hamburgers and hot dogs. Just what you want and enjoy the cook-out. There is always someone in the crowd who is willing to lend a hand with the preparation or cooking.

Why not try barbecuing a few ribs during the late afternoon? It is a good way to get your guests involved. You can always get your grill for the main dish together and adding a few more charcoal briquets.

- SKEWER APPETIZERS**
- 2 tablespoons oil
  - 1 cup soft bread crumbs (about 1 1/2)
  - 2 tablespoons chopped onion
  - 1 pound ground beef
  - 6 cocktail sausages
  - 1/4 cup pickle slices
  - 1 cup catsup
  - 1/2 cup margarine
  - 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
  - 2 tablespoons vinegar
- Combine first six in meatballer. Turn into 18 meatballs. Thread cocktail sausages, pickles, and meatballs alternately on skewers. Grill over medium coals about 10 minutes, turning once or twice. In saucepan, combine syrup, catsup, margarine, and vinegar; simmer. Brush over kabobs just before removing from coals. Serve with crackers or cubes of French bread.

- GARLIC-BUTTERED SHRIMP**
- 1 clove garlic, minced
  - 1 tablespoon minced parsley
  - 1/2 cup melted butter
  - 3 tablespoons dry white wine

Butter and season long leaves of French bread. Choose the most of your choice.
