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ards," Ford stated.
"Ordinarily, Congress should not be the business of writing safety standards," Ford stated. "But I see a need for Congress to act immediately in the interest of public safety. So I introduced legislation early this year and it was signed into law on July 11."

The testing requirements in the new standard are designed to reduce the flammability and corrosiveness of cellulose insulation. After Sept. 8, cellulose products unable to pass a test that will measure the product's resistance to flame may not be marketed. Also, cellulose insulation must be labeled.

According to Ford, "One of the fundamental parts of our energy program is to insulate 90 percent of American homes by 1985, and we have encouraged this project in Congress by the introduction of tax credit legislation."

"Home insulation is a critical component of the national energy conservation effort, which means consumer confidence in home insulation products should be at a high level."

MSU turning to private funds for athletics

MOREHEAD—For the first time in its 56-year history, Morehead State University is turning to private funding sources to help finance intercollegiate athletics.

MSU President Morris L. Norfleet and a group of Morehead businessmen have announced the formation of the Eagle Athletic Foundation as a fund-raising organization for athletics.

"We feel the foundation offers an excellent opportunity for our alumni and other friends who wish to give direct financial support to intercollegiate athletics," Dr. Norfleet said. "The funds will be handled in strict compliance with NCAA, AAUW and OVC rules and regulations and the foundation definitely will not be involved in the management of our athletic program."

Acting president of the foundation is Harold Bellamy, Morehead insurance executive.

"We feel the University cannot continue to upgrade its athletic program on the funds available now," Mr. Bellamy said. "The time is right to accept outside money and help men's and women's sports in an appropriate manner."

He said the donated funds would be disbursed by the University and that supporters could earmark their gifts for certain sports or the total athletic program.

Membership categories have been created with privileges for each contribution level, ranging from \$25 to \$1,000 or more.

"Privileges start at \$25 but gifts of any amount certainly are welcome," Mr. Bellamy added.
