Car seats for small children should be bought carefully

Buying and using an auto seat restraint for your child is the best protection you can provide in case of an accident or sudden stop, state highway safety officials remind parents. "There's nothing so bad as a mother driving along with an infant in her lap or on the seat beside her, unrestrained and unprotected," Bernice Maffei, state highway safety coordinator, said.

Compulsory car seat security is still being considered

The question of whether coverage under the social security program should be compulsory has been considered many times by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, various advisory groups, and the Congress since the program began more than 20 years ago. The decision has always been that it is essential that the program be compulsory. While some workers might be able to provide adequately for themselves and their families, Maffei said that approved seat restraints can be found in most department stores and new car dealerships. "Look for the required label that specifies the type of car, seating capacity and the maximum weight of the child before you buy," she said.

Unrestrained children can also cause accidents, Maffei said.

He also explained that in a recent driver's attention was diverted from the road when one of her four children fell off the seat. She took her eyes off the road, reversed, and ran into a truck. That one distraction caused severe injury to all the occupants of the car, he said.

Basic skills testing to be given in April

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At a recent meeting of test coordinators and school officials in Frankfort, Van Fleet outlined the responsibilities of state and local officials for the testing program.
