

More than 200 professionals coming to Rodeo

More than 200 professional cowboys and cowgirls from across America and Canada will be converging on the Rupp Arena at the Lexington Center Feb. 10-12 for the Longhorn World Championship Rodeo.

The entry list will read like the Who's Who in the world of professional rodeo and all of the current world champions and constants are expected to compete, barring serious injuries at other rodeos immediately preceding this one.

The callers of livestock appearing in the contests will be outstanding, too, with world champion bucking horse Gold Plated and Panic included in the herd of 130 competitive animals.

Geared specifically as a family show, the Longhorn Rodeo has been proclaimed by experts in the entertainment field as a perfect blend of color and excitement for all audience viewing.

Performances will be at 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday with Sunday's performance at 12 p.m. Opening night is Shogun Night with all seats priced at only \$4. Prices for Saturday and Sunday are \$6.95-20.45 with kids 12 years of age and under half price.

Boy's Clubs awarded major LEAA grant

The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) of the U. S. Department of Justice has awarded a grant to the Boy's Clubs of America, the national youth organization announced today.

A total of more than \$700,000 over two years will fund a national project for delinquency prevention, initially involving Boys' Club facilities and professional staff in nine test cities.

Each of the nine test programs developed will be studied and evaluated for later adaptation by other Boys' Clubs of America affiliates.

The following cities have been chosen as test sites: Birmingham and Schenectady, N. Y.; Hollywood and Richmond, Calif.; Bridgeport, Conn.; Omaha, Neb.; Las Cruces, N. Mex.; Astbury Park, N. J.; and Waco, Tex.

Boys' Clubs have been forerunners for many years in the development of positive youth programs specifically designed to prevent delinquent behavior.

"Low-income, one parent, inner-city areas are often contributing factors to delinquency development. Since many Boys' Clubs serve areas with youth affected by one or more of these factors, (Boys' Clubs) are a natural place for an intensified effort like this."

Objectives of the project include direct youth involvement in planning and operating various projects and activities, as well as 30-year participant employment for some 50 young participants who will serve as part-time staff aides.

Participating Clubs will also recruit more than 100 volunteers from among the youth, parents, educators and leaders of the pilot site communities to provide support and services for the project.

The Boys' Clubs of America currently serve over one million youth in more than 700 communities throughout all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Previous major national projects have included youth employment preparation for family life, alcohol abuse prevention, and health education and services.

Senators protest research termination

The Department of Agriculture's proposal to terminate all federal support for tobacco production research at the University of Kentucky has drawn a strong protest from Senators Walter (Doc) Hollister and Wendell Ford.

In a letter to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, the Senators called the decision "a totally illogical one that will be extremely detrimental both to the tobacco industry and to the state of Kentucky."
