Kay's Kitchen

Here are the sister Apple Crisp recipes I promised last week. Do hope they answer your need.

APPLE CRISP
4 cups apples, sliced
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 egg white
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup flour
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup coconut

Place apples in baking dish. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, cinnamon and salt; sprinkle over top of apples. Add water. Combine remaining ingredients and sprinkle over top; bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees. Serve warm with cream.

APPLE-COCONUT CRISP
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup coconut
1 egg
1/2 cup shortening, melted
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
Place apples in buttered 8 x 8 baking dish; together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, coconut and egg until crumbly; sprinkle over apples. Pour over all the melted and cooled shortening. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes.

APPLE CRISP II
7 or 8 large cooking apples
Sugar to taste
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup coconut

Peel, core and slice apples into an 8 x 8 inch baking dish. Sprinkle with sugar to taste. (If apples are not tart enough sprinkle with lemon juice.) Combine the rest of the ingredients with a pastry blender so they will be light and not oily. Sprinkle over apples. Bake 35 degrees for about 30 minutes. Serve warm with or without cream or ice cream. You might find the topping a bit heavy; if so loosen the amount of each ingredient listed. With fast cooking apples, it is a bit moist.

APPLE CRISP CAKE
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon margarine
1/2 cup warm water

Dr. and Mrs. Jim Noll will teach natural family planning classes

Natural family planning will be the subject of a series of four monthly classes taught by the Couple to Couple League at the Nicholas County Library beginning on Monday, March 4. Classes start at 7:30 p.m. and last for 90 minutes. The method taught by the Couple to Couple League is a system of fertility awareness in which several symptoms of female fertility are used in a cross-checking way for the greatest reliability and confidence. According to the League, this system (called the sympto-thermal method) can achieve an effectiveness at the 98% level in actual practice. The League notes that this system is definitely not the same as calendar rhythm, and that it is an improvement over both the temperature-only method and the Billings Ovulation Method. The League also states that its method assumes that every woman has irregular cycles. As an organization, the League dates back to 1971 when John Sheila Ripley teamed up with Ronald Prem, M.D., Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Minnesota School of Medicine. Dr. Prem serves as the head of the League's Medical Advisory Board and is firmly convinced that the value of having well trained couples instruct other couples. The classes at Nicholas County Library will be taught by Jim and Joan Noll, a CCL Certified Teaching Couple. The non-profit League is an interfaith organization dedicated to providing education about natural family planning. The typical class has a majority of Catholics in attendance, but more and more Protestants and those of other faiths have been attending in the last couple of years. The League

Califano tactics 'cast cloud' over leaf farmers

The Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association this week condemned what it called "the intemperate anti-tobacco publicity accompanying HEW Secretary Joseph Califano's crusade." The excessive "rhetoric and publicity-seeking," said the co-op's board, are "shocking and appalling" to burley farmers and their representatives, "a key element in our nation's agriculture." The Califano campaign tactics, said the co-op, have "cast a cloud over a valued and honorable pursuit, held in respect since colonial America — the growing and marketing of tobacco." The board gave the industry a deadline: "The Califano campaign 'has far exceeded the bounds of propriety for a Federal regulatory agency,'" and that its proponents "smack of over-regulation, repression, prohibition and behavior-control." The charges were made in a resolution passed by the board, and sent to government officials, including Kentucky's Congressional delegation.

Protect heating system and water pipes from freezing by controlling thermostat

If you turn your thermostat down too low on extra-cold nights, it's possible for the water pipes in your heating system to freeze. The danger is to pipes in unheated spaces, such as a basement, or near outside walls. Here's what can happen, according to Robert Pehr, an agricultural engineer with the UK College of Agriculture Cooperative Extension Service: If you turn the thermostat down to 50 degrees Fahrenheit, for instance, it could take an hour or two for the house to cool down to that temperature. During this period, no water is circulating through the pipes. If you're going to be away from home for an extended period of time and there is a possibility of bitter-cold weather while you're away, set the thermostat no lower than 60 degrees. That should cause the heating system to kick on frequently enough to circulate water through the pipes and head off the possibility of freezing. If power lines are down or if for other reasons you have a long period without fuel for your heating system in abnormally-cold weather, you may need to drain your pipes to head off the possibility of freezing. That goes for your plumbing, too. Even plumbing that is insulated and also protected with heat tapes can freeze if the air around it gets cold enough.

KET head obeys order of governor

In response to Governor Julian Carroll's order for state agencies to effect a 25 percent reduction of energy consumption, KET Executive Director O. Leonard Press has ordered power input to the system's transmitters reduced. The governor's order and consequent power reduction result from the 10-week old nationwide coal strike. Shortly after Press' order, network engineers began to change taps on transformers to reduce plate voltage and current. Present plans call for the equivalent of a 30 percent reduction of power input to the 13 transmitters which compose the bulk of the state public television network. Bob Klein, director of engineering of The Kentucky Network, notes that the total energy saved by the reduction will be over 300,000 kilowatts per broadcast hour.
