Califano resignation asked

A resolution calling for the resignation of Joseph A. Califano, secretary of the federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare, was introduced in and passed the Kentucky House of Representatives last week 85-14. The resolution, introduced by Rep. Buddy Adams (D-Bowling Green), came in response to Mr. Califano's proposed anti-smoking campaign.

According to Rep. Adams, some 170,000 Kentucky families rely on agriculture and tobacco for their livelihood. He pointed out that Kentucky is dependent on tobacco as a major source of income, adding that the income from tobacco accounts for nearly one-half of the state's total farm income.

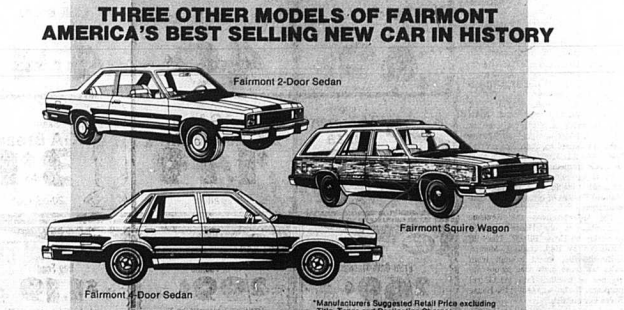

Legislative Week in review

In the Kentucky General Assembly's second week of legislative action, a number of bills were discussed that are of interest to Kentucky farmers and rural citizens.

Senate Bill 1 was favorably reported by the Senate committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources of which I am a member.

The need for this bill was explained to the panel by Dr. Bobby Pass, State Entomologist and chairman of the Department of Entomology at the University of Kentucky. The bill would exempt out-of-state nurseries from state licensing, if they are properly licensed in their residential state.

Senator Doug Mosley, (R) Columbia, has requested an investigation into the preservation of the red fox in the state. The House Agriculture and Natural Resources committee put the endorsement on House Bill 12. The bill sponsored by Rep. James Bruce, D-Hopkinsville, exempts from sales tax, on-farm facilities for grain or soybean handling, drying, processing or storing.

The Committee also favorably reported House Resolution 12 which requests the Kentucky General Assembly to take for the continued use of male hydrate, commonly called MH. The ingredient is used widely in Kentucky to control tobacco suckers. The Environmental Protection Agency is presently considering banning this heavily used ingredient.

Earlier last week, Senator Joe Wright, D-Harrod, introduced Senate Bill 84 which would give livestock owners 72 hours to report damages to the livestock caused by dog bites. The present law states that these complaints must be made immediately to the Department of Agriculture. The bill has been assigned to the Senate Agriculture and Natural Resources committee for consideration.

The Appropriations and Revenue Committee in the House reported favorably on House Bill 83. The bill, sponsored by Rep. Ramsey Morris, D-Hopkinsville, would exempt from sales tax those fuels used to operate engines or tractors for agricultural purposes. The bill was sent to the House Rules Committee.

Rep. Elvin Patrick, R-Williamsburg, has introduced House Bill 181. The bill would permit persons 65 years of age or older the right to hunt and fish without a license beginning Jan. 1 of the year in which the person turns 65. This amends a state statute which permits those over 65 the right to fish and hunt without a license on the date of their 60th birthday. This bill is in the House Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee.
