**DOUBLE-DECKER PIZZA BURGERS**  
2 pounds ground beef  
1 1/2 cups onion  
1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese  
1/2 cup finely chopped pepperoni  
1 teaspoon oregano

8 slices mozzarella cheese, halved  
4 hamburger buns  
Sliced pepperoni  
Combine beef, 1/2 cup pizza sauce, parmesan cheese, pepperoni, oregano, salt and onion. Shape into 12 patties. Broil over medium coals 3 to 4 minutes. **MUSHROOM-BACON BURGERS**  
1 pound ground beef  
1/2 cup onion  
4 slices bacon, cooked crisp, drained and crumbled  
1/2 cup sliced green onions  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 hamburger buns  
Combine ground beef, mushrooms, onion, Worcestershire sauce, and salt. Shape into patties and broil to desired doneness. Serve on split buns, topped with additional onion if desired. These hamburger recipes are good for extending the beef. The addition of the pepperoni, mushrooms, etc., also are a taste treat.

**ONION POTATOES**  
6 medium baking potatoes  
4 tablespoons margarine, softened  
1 envelope dry onion soup mix  
Scrub potatoes. Cut each cross-wise into 1/2 sliced slices. Boil in salted water and onion soup mix; spread on one side of each potato slice. Reassemble potatoes. Wrap each in foil, sealing well. Bake on grill over coals for about one hour. Turn depends on size of potatoes. Turn

**PEANUT BUTTER OATMEAL BARS**  
1/4 cup shortening  
1/4 cup white sugar  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
1/2 cup vanilla  
1 egg  
2 tablespoons sliced green onions  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup quick cooking rolled oats  
Cream together shortening, sugars, and salt. Beat in eggs, vanilla, and peanut butter, and vanilla until light and fluffy. Add egg and milk; beat well. Sift together flour, soda, and salt. Add to creamed mixture; beat just until well mixed. Stir in oatmeal. Spread evenly in greased 13 x 9 x 2 inch pan. Bake 350 degrees for about 20 minutes. Cool thoroughly.

## Kentucky job corps wants more women recruits

Mancil J. Vinson, Alumni Director of Murray State University and former Assistant Commissioner of Agriculture, plans to announce his intention of receiving the Democratic nomination for the Commissioner of Agriculture in Kentucky.

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's Job Corps is recruiting trainees across the state with an emphasis being placed on enrolling women, according to Mary Jo Rodgers, state Job Corps manager for the Department for Human Resources.

"President Carter's economic stimulus package provides for doubling the number of people in Job Corps nationwide and calls for bringing the male/female trainee ratio to 50/50," Ms. Rodgers said.

The expansion of the Job Corps also means new training opportunities for enrollees of both sexes, she said. Those who have their high school diploma and quality can now enter college through the Job Corps. Several colleges across the state are participating in this two year associate degree program.

The Job Corps was established in 1965 as a national residential program for economically disadvantaged youth 16 to 19 years of age. It provides health education, including preparation for the high school equivalency exam, vocational training, work experience, dual credit, and a part of the world of work," Ms. Rodgers said.

Young men and women who enter Job Corps may stay as long as two years. Job training is offered in entry-level occupations in such fields as health care, auto mechanics, clerical, electronics and building trades in which unions and the National Association of Home Builders participate. Traditionally male-oriented trades such as carpentry, welding and construction work now welcome women trainees, she said.

The graduation rate from the Job Corps in Kentucky has climbed significantly over the last two years and the placement rate for those who complete the program is around 80 per cent. Many placements have a starting salary of four to five dollars an hour depending on the skill and area in which the trainee specializes.

To apply for the Job Corps, interested persons should contact the Department for Human Resources, Bureau for Manpower Services office nearest to them and talk to the Job Corps recruiter. Applicants must have permission to join from parents or guardians, and be physically and mentally able to participate in Job Corps activities.
