It seems the local strawberry crop has come and gone before I really had my share. With the price of berries in the market staying around one dollar a quart I have to content myself with serving them in desserts where few are called for. No question about it, you can hardly improve on the flavor of fresh strawberries "as is". But when you have to, you can make some pretty good things using only a pint of berries, or a 16 oz. package of frozen berries.

FOUR LAYER DESSERT
1 1/2 cups finely crushed vanilla wafers
2 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons melted margarine
4 egg whites
1 pint fresh strawberries, hulled and sliced
2 tablespoons sugar
1 cup whipping cream
Combine crumbs, the 2 tablespoons sugar, and the melted margarine. Press into 8x12 inch baking dish. In large mixer bowl, beat egg whites till soft peaks form. Gradually add the 1/2 cup sugar, beating till stiff peaks form. Beat meringue over cream. Bake in moderate oven for 15 to 20 minutes; cool. Whip cream; spread over meringue. Top with strawberries, sprinkled with the 2 tablespoons of sugar.

STRAWBERRY CHEESE PIE
1 cup tiny marshmallows
1/2 cup milk

1 8-ounce package strawberry gelatin
1/2 cup water
1 8-ounce package cream cheese
1 16-ounce package frozen strawberries, thawed
1/2 cup whipping cream
1 8-ounce package pastry shell
In saucepan, heat milk and marshmallows over medium heat, stirring frequently, till marshmallows are melted. Cool. In small saucepan, combine gelatin and water; heat and stir till gelatin is melted. Combine cooled marshmallow mixture and gelatin, gradually beat into softened cream cheese. Drain berries, reserving syrup. Add water to syrup to equal one cup liquid; stir syrup into gelatin mixture; fold in berries. Whip cream; fold into whipped gelatin mixture. Pour into pastry shell. Chill till set.

STRAWBERRY MERINGUE PUFFS
2 egg whites
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup sugar
1 8-ounce package instant vanilla pudding mix
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups whipping cream
2 pint fresh strawberries or 4 16 ounce packages, thawed
1 teaspoon vanilla
Prepare pudding according to package directions; chill till set. Beat egg white light and fluffy. Beat in sugar, whipping cream and pudding. Stir in strawberries, vanilla, and 1/2 teaspoon red food coloring. Freeze in ice cream freezer according to manufacturer's directions. Makes 2 quarts.

unif. golden brown. Remove from oven. Fill center of each cup with a scoop of ice cream. Spoon thawed berries over ice cream.

MERINGUES AND STRAWBERRIES
For four good size meringue shells, you will need two egg whites, 1/4 cup sugar, pinch of cream of tartar, high speed, gradually add 1/2 teaspoon salt and the 1/2 cup of sugar. When stiff peaks are formed, shape into meringue shells on a piece of brown paper. Bake at 250 degrees for one hour. Gradually cool meringues. Store in air tight tin. To serve, fill center with a few berries, one scoop of ice cream and top with berries.

HOMEMADE STRAWBERRY ICE CREAM
3/4 cup milk
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup whipping cream
2 pint fresh strawberries or 4 16 ounce packages, thawed
1 teaspoon vanilla
Prepare pudding according to package directions; chill till set. Beat egg white light and fluffy. Beat in sugar, whipping cream and pudding. Stir in strawberries, vanilla, and 1/2 teaspoon red food coloring. Freeze in ice cream freezer according to manufacturer's directions. Makes 2 quarts.

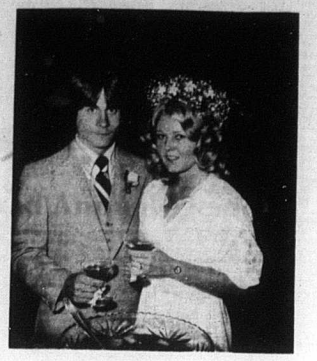
Huffer-Alexander vows solemnized at Carlisle United Methodist Church

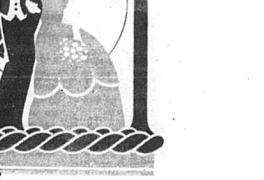

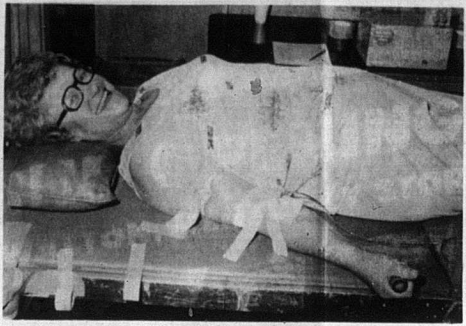
