CRAB MEAT SALAD
1 cup fresh or canned crabmeat, flaked
2 hard-boiled eggs, chopped
1 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon vinegar
Salt to taste

Combine all ingredients; chill. Serve on lettuce. Garnish with tomato wedges and sliced, toasted almonds. Should serve four.

Use one can shrimp and one can crabmeat. Combine with celery, mayonnaise, and a dash of salt. Hot garlic bread goes nicely with this. If you are adding sprigs of parsley with your salad be sure to eat it. It is delicious, and high in vitamin content.

SALMON COLD PLATE
For a refreshing summer meal, arrange a platter of chilled canned, salmon, broiled and skin removed, topped with cucumber Sauce, sliced tomatoes, crisp pickles, carrot curls, and stick of fresh mozzarella and celery.

LOUISIANA SALAD
2 cups cooked, diced potatoes
1/2 cup diced celery
2 hard-boiled eggs, chopped
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon vinegar
1/2 cup grated onion
1/4 teaspoon salt
Pepper

Mix gently mix all ingredients Chill for one hour. Serve on lettuce as desired.

CUCUMBER SAUCE
1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 cup grated cucumber (Peel and seed cucumber if very large)
Add salt to cream. Gradually add vinegar, beating constantly until thick and stiff. Fold in cucumbers. Makes

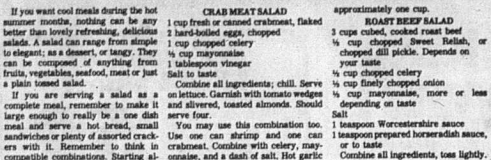
Miss Edna Trussell to marry July 29

ASCS reports on farm facility loan program

Nicholas County farmers who may be faced with storage problems this fall can obtain funds to build additional facilities or to expand present storage structures, Eugene Letcher, an official of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, (ASCS) said.

During the past year, provisions of the farm facility and drying equipment loan program were broadened and liberalized to increase on-farm storage, and to insure adequate space for the 1978 harvest and grain placed in the reserve.

Under the program, farmers can borrow up to \$50,000 on facilities adequate to store two years' crops, with 15 per cent down and 1 per cent interest, to build typical, conventional type on-farm storage facilities such as steel bins, wooden grainaries, and wet storage structures. The cost of concrete and electrical wiring is also covered under the program," Letcher said.

He pointed out that facility loans are secured loans and borrowers must provide adequate security to farm est. The program provides for an eight year repayment term.
