Dissatisfaction with postal service causes Sen. Ford to introduce legislation

Senator Wendell Ford has introduced legislation that would restore responsibility for appointment of the Postmaster General to the President, subject to Senate confirmation.
Ford said the proposal "stands a reasonably good chance of being approved because of what I perceive to be growing dissatisfaction with the way the Postal Service presently is being operated."
The nation's postal system is a basic, constituency-oriented public service, and Americans have come to rely on it," Ford added.
"However, if the American public is to have the level of service that it expects and deserves, the Postal Service must be made more responsive to government policy-makers and the people's elected representatives."

Ford said that the Postal Service has progressively deteriorated since Congress gave the agency status as an independent government corporation in 1970.
"The experience of seven years has demonstrated that the Postal Service's achievements have fallen far short of nearly everyone's expectations," Ford said.
"Among the more evident examples of the Postal Service's short-sightedness during this period are the extent of recent rate increases, the wholesale post office closings in rural areas, and efforts to discontinue six-day mail delivery."

Ford said that Presidential appointment of the Postmaster General could have a positive impact in several areas:
