## A tribute to a man of many virtues

Some receive their plaudits while alive and with us. Too often when one goes home to his heavenly home, we realize then what we should have been doing for our friend and now all that can be done is memorials in our wish that he has done for us all.

Few of us know the many unknown deeds and acts of kindones Paul E. Garrett did in his community which he adopted as home after leaving Glasgow, Ky. He loved his Baptist Church and was always willing to do his part to help it in any way possible. He was of time in helping in a building program.

He loved his community. He was always available to try and obtain a factory for his town which he and others accomplished in 1954. He was most civic minded and was a charter member of the Carlisle Rotary Club formed in 1945. He believed in serving his town and county and was one of the five original directors of the Nicholas County Development Corporation that made Lake Caronde a reality. He served as a member of the Carlisle City Council and was a member of Dougherty Lodge # and A.M. No. 44.

## 'Redtape'

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Bids are required for all purchases of \$5,000 or more, raised from \$2,000 by the 1978 General Assembly.

The state Division of Purchases can make state price contracts available to all local governments. These allow a county to take advantage of statewide specifications, vendor selection and special prices on price contract items.

All local governments must comply with the Local Article of the Model Procurement Code effective Jan. 1, 1980. This will take some of the rigidity out of existing procedures for negotiating major contracts.

The procurement code also specifically authorizes cooperative purchasing agreements among local governments. This can increase a county's buying power as supplies and equipment purchased jointly by a number of small governments not only help costs down but also may benefit from the joint ability to provide a staff person to do the technical work. Joint purchasing contracts also can be developed. This would make a given price available to all governments participating in the cooperative agreement.

Purchasing is not a simple matter. The process includes: establishing specifications or conditions the item must meet; selecting suppliers or vendors; advertising if that is required; developing policies for handling real estate purchase or sale; maintaining storage and inventory control; and developing policies for disposing of surplus property.

Procedures should be established in the administrative code for handling each of these tasks. A common practice among local governments has been to buy from local businesses if possible. Inflation is making even this a luxury for purchases that can be made in bulk or through price contract.

## Free chest x-rays offered

FRANKFORT — Free chest x-rays and blood tests to detect histoplasmosis will be available to the public on Friday, July 28, at the Paris Stockyard. The tests are offered by the Kentucky Department for Human Resources.

According to Dr. Ernest W. Chick, director of the department's Mycology Center in Paris, histoplasmosis is a lung disease which can develop when spores from a certain fungus (Histoplasma Capsulatum) are inhaled. This fungus can grow in old chicken houses and pigeon lites, attic, rotting logs, and other places where mold would grow.

Histoplasmosis (often called "blat") often resembles tuberculosis, said Chick, and may have the same symptoms as influenza: slight fever, cough, a general worn-out feeling.

"Anyone who is exposed to air which contains large amounts of the spores may get blat," said Chick. "Young children and persons moving into an area where the disease is common are particularly susceptible."
