The need to conserve energy touches every facet of our lives: at home, work and school; in transportation and in the manner in which recreation needs are met. A quick dip in the pool, the long planned vacation, an evening out at a local high school sporting event—all may have negative effects on energy conservation if the same time could be planned in such a way that their energy impact would be lessened.

Save Energy, Save Dollars slogan does not question individual preferences on recreation or recreational equipment; it does advocate the efficient use of energy for recreation.

Swimming Pool—It may not be necessary for the swimming pool filter to run continuously. The amount of leaves and dust which blow into the pools and level of use determine how frequently pool water must be filtered. The amount of time a filter needs to be operated can be determined by trial.

When automatics are used for pool filtration, the concentration of chemicals can be adjusted to the operation schedule of the filter. Indirectly, you can save energy by using the minimum amount of chemicals necessary to maintain pool sanitation.

Motorcycles use very little fuel per mile. They need to be tuned and maintained as directed in owner's manuals.

Bicycles are excellent ways to save energy and dollars. Ride a bike for exercise, to lighten, to work, to school, etc. Safe bikeways need to be developed in each community.

Family Recreation—In any living situation and at any time of year, look into table and yard games for the family. There is much need for fun, for letting us know one another and for energy conservation right in your own back yard.

Sporting Events advocate scheduling of daytime events to avoid lighting requirements. Organize car pools among friends and neighbors to avoid from sporting events. Save temper and energy. Leave early or wait until traffic lets up to avoid traffic jams.

Vacations and Camping—Use man transportation instead of the family car. If you stay in one place instead of "hopping" around, you can save energy of the area and enjoy it by hiking, walking, or bicycling.

You may consider camping close to home instead of traveling long distances. It is important to be energy conscious with our types of camping equipment. Families often carry bicycling or motorcycles to use for local transportation especially if motor homes are used for travel.

Boating—Maintenance of a power boat is as important as it is with an automobile. Carrying or towing a boat by car reduces the motor's fuel economy.

Trail bikes need to be kept in top operating condition. Tune them regularly and follow the manufacturer's maintenance recommendation. Develop trails near the community to avoid traveling long distances to other sites.
