The Kentucky Historical Society has the largest collection of early 19th century dresses in the state. Elizabeth Perkins, museum curator, has used many of them to create a new exhibit, "The Fashionable Image," on display at the Kentucky History Museum through June.

The exhibit traces the evolution of women's fashions from the Empire style worn around 1805, dressed up from the classic robes of Greek Democracy, to the extremes of 1875, when skirts were so narrow that women bound their legs together with tape. Included in this exhibit are examples of the crinoline and hoop which provided material for cartonists throughout the 1860s.

Perkins and her assistant, Cathy Zwyer, spent several months doing research to prepare a full-color picture which may be purchased by visitors to the museum in the Old Capitol Annex, Frankfort.

These two day visiting dresses of the 1860s show the hoop at its greatest width, the scalloped and puffed, beige silk tulle cape (center) would have been worn with these dresses.

Kay's Kitchen

If you need an excuse to celebrate, and after months of ice and snow, who doesn't? Well you can thank the Irish for giving us a holiday celebration on March 17. You can have a St. Patrick's Day get-together. You don't have to be Irish, just join your celebrating friends and remember to keep it GREEN.

Heavily the food can be anything tasty and attractive. Green food coloring does not mix with anything, so if something needs to be green, just add the coloring and go on. Of course there are plenty of green foods so if the idea of coloring food doesn't appeal, you can have natural green.

These are well traveled recipes; they were sent to me from England by my cousin, and were given to her by an Irish friend. Folklore says the cross on top of the bread keeps the leprechauns away. If you ask the Irish it is not folklore, it is the gospel truth.

DUBLIN MEAT PIE
1 cup bread crumbs from very stale white bread
2 teaspoons ground allspice
3 teaspoons grated butter
1/2 cup grated very sharp cheddar
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
1/4 cup water
1/2 cup canned evaporated milk
2 eggs
Combine the first four ingredients in a bowl. Dilute the milk with the water, and pour half of this bowl over the meats, etc. You will use the rest of the milk-water to glaze the pastry.

MULLIGAN CAKE
3/4 cup bread crumbs from very stale white bread
