## KET plans extended coverage

KET is planning extended legislative coverage during what is expected to be the final week of the current session of the General Assembly.

The late evening edition of "Kentucky General Assembly 1978" adds an extra 30 minutes on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday beginning March 13. On these evenings, the program begins at 10:30 p.m. (ET), 9:30 p.m. (CT). Late night coverage on Thursday, March 16 remains at 11 p.m. (ET), 10 p.m. (CT) following "Live From The Mer".

In addition to expanded weeknight coverage, there are plans to pre-empt regular programming on Saturday, March 18 in order to broadcast the events of the final day of the state legislature. It is anticipated that coverage provided by KET on Saturday would be live from Frankfort.

The expansion of "Kentucky General Assembly 1978" results from an anticipated heavy work load before the legislative body during its final week.

## Carlisle to get snow money

Gov. Julian Carroll has decided to allocate \$22,201.80 to cities throughout the Commonwealth to aid them in recouping expenditures related to the heavy snow and ice of January. Carlisle will receive \$52.65.

The money comes from the \$2 million allocated last month by the General Assembly. The Governor announced last month that he was willing to allocate \$1,121,851.80 to counties under a formula which took into account both road mileage and population. He had previously granted each county up to \$10,000 for snow removal expenses, and reimbursement out of that pool had to be verified expenses only.

The remainder of the \$2 million General Assembly allocation is being distributed to agencies which incurred extraordinary expenses related to serving human needs during the winter storms.

## February coldest on record

The ground hog may have come outside on that traditional day in February to check on the end of winter, but the frigid temperatures sent him scurrying back to his warm den.

February was an extremely cold month with record breaking conditions that will probably result in higher electric bills later on, according to a spokesman for Kentucky Utilities Company.

The National Weather Service has reported that last month's average temperature in Kentucky was 23.1 degrees, nearly three degrees lower than the record set in 1865. Based on information for the Lexington-Blue Grass area, there were 1,218 heating degree days (DD) in February which was an increase of 46.8% over last February's 836 DD's. Compared to the 30 year average, last month's degree days showed an increase of 46.8% above normal.

Heating degree days are determined by subtracting the mean temperature in a 24 hour period from a base of 65

degrees Fahrenheit requires little or no heating. January and February had a total of 2,807 DD's for an increase of 11.5% over the same period in 1977 and 39.8% more than the 20 year average of 1,877 DD's for the two months.

Although customers practiced conservation by the wise use of electricity, heating units and other electrically powered equipment were undoubtedly used more because of the extended period of cold weather. It is important, the spokesman said, that all of KV's customers continue their assistance in load reduction to help improve the reduced coal stockpiles and to save on their electric bills.
