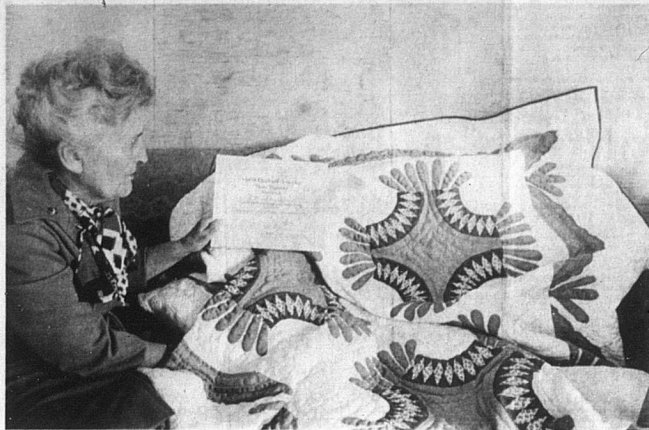

Mrs. Grimes Caywood will remember winter of '78 and her award winning quilt design

Mrs. Grimes Caywood of North Street in Carlisle will probably always remember the winter of 1978. While many people grumbled and complained, she channeled her free time into the construction and design of an award winning quilt.

Mrs. Caywood, who is a member of West Carlisle Homemakers Club, said she noticed an advertisement in Good

Housekeeping magazine that publicized a Great Quilts of America Contest sponsored by the U. S. Historical Society, Good Housekeeping and the Museum of American Folk Art. The contest was to be the largest ever conducted in the world. Mrs. Caywood didn't give it much thought but after much prompting from her daughter, she decided she would enter a quilt that

she had recently made. Much to her surprise, in March the sponsors of the contest notified her that out of the 10,000 entries in the contest, she had been chosen as one of the finalists. The sponsors also explained that the quilts had been judged (and by some very prestigious judges) on overall beauty, color selection, materials and

technique. Mrs. Caywood designed the quilt using an older quilt that was a pattern similar to the Missouri Beauty. She also selected the colors which were bright reds, greens and apricot. The quilting was done by Mrs. Allen Rife. Although she didn't place first in the contest, Mrs. Caywood received a certificate and a bronze medal declaring her one of the chosen finalists and that bestowed a great honor.

Hospital board unanimously revises patient procedures

The Nicholas County Hospital Board of Directors have, by a unanimous vote, revised their admission and dismissal procedures as well as their outpatient and emergency room procedures.

The revision was made so as to crack down on those patients who fail to pay their balance which results in the hospital losing operational funds.

Among the new procedures is an admission rule which states that a patient with an outstanding balance of two or more previous visits will not be allowed entry. The only exceptions being: if a true emergency exists or there is a record of consistent and current record of payments or consent from the hospital board.

Kentucky Judicial Conference to be held at Owensboro May 8-9

The Kentucky Judicial Conference will be held at the Executive Inn, Owensboro on May 8-9. Justices of the Supreme Court and Judges of the Court of Appeals, Circuit Court and District Court will be in attendance.

William E. Davis, Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts, has announced that the conference theme will be "Communications". Principal speaker will be Dr. Franklin P. Kilpatrick, Director of the Behavioral Sciences Center, Nova University. Dr. Kilpatrick is an authority on perception, learning and communications and has actively participated in judicial confer-

ences in other states. Panelists have been invited to address the conference on Media-Judiciary Communications. Participants in these sessions include James L. Crawford, editor of the Corbin Times-Tribune; Circuit Judge L. T. Grant, 22nd Judicial Circuit; Ken Loomis, editorial writer, Louisville Times; Don Mills, editor of the Lexington Herald; and Al Smith, editor and publisher of the Russellville News-Democrat and Logan Leader.

A session on Court Reporting in the Trial and Appellate Courts has been planned. Participants will be Sandra

Earley, producer and host of "Kentucky Now," Kentucky Educational Television; Jeffrey Marks, editorial director, WHAS; Judge James Park, Jr., Court of Appeals; and Circuit Judge George B. Hyatt, 30th Judicial Circuit.

Other topics on the agenda include a report by Chief Justice John S. Palmer; a report on the activities of the Kentucky Judicial Council; regional administration and communication between judges and law clerks. The Circuit Judges' Association will hold their annual business meeting during the conference.

Carlisle Manufacturing recognized for expansion

The Carlisle Manufacturing Company was recognized recently for expanding its operation during 1977. The company was among 500 industrial jobs, 100,000 that is needed for manufacturing alone, by the year 2000.

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Carlisle rail service abandoned by L&N...

Cost of feed, fertilizer and farm equipment increased More truck traffic added to road, tax revenues lost Industrial development less likely . . .

Without your help, these statements could well come true by the end of this month, according to Dr. James Noll, local Chamber of Commerce representative. The Interstate Commerce Commission's (ICC) hearing on L. & N.'s application to abandon the Paris to Maysville Branch Railroad will be held in less than two weeks, on May 15, in Flemingsburg.

A group of local citizens from the four counties affected (Bourbon, Nicholas, Fleming, and Mason) have formed the Save the Paris to Maysville Branch Committee to fight the abandonment. Dr. Noll represents the Carlisle-Nicholas County Chamber of Commerce on this Committee.

The Committee has held numerous meetings in the four counties to inform the people of what is happening and to seek their support. The Committee has hired an attorney to represent it at the hearing and is presently gathering

evidence and interviewing all possible witnesses. In the process, it has been discovered that there is a third party company ready to buy the rail line if abandonment can be halted. This company already has detailed plans for renovation of the line and expansion of services.

It seems like a great opportunity, but it still requires a lot of time, effort, and money. Donations to the Committee are being accepted at both the Deposit Bank and the First National Bank. Letters to the Interstate Commerce Commission would help if mailed immediately. The address is: H. G. City of Carlisle may pay more for natural gas

The city of Carlisle may expect to pay more for natural gas this year. Carlisle's suppliers, Delta Natural Gas Company of Winchester has been granted a 5.12 per cent rate increase by the Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC).

The increase on gas supplied after April 30 will amount to an estimated annual revenue increase of \$66,508.

Causes of the adjustment is the increased cost of wholesale natural gas from one of Delta's suppliers, Columbia Gas Transmission Corp.

Under the new monthly rates, customers will pay \$4.98 for the first 1,000 cubic feet, \$2.69 per 1,000 cubic feet for the next 9,000 cubic feet and \$2.42 per 1,000 cubic feet for all over 10,000 cubic feet.

Immunization, a must according to law

Because serious childhood diseases can be prevented by immunization, a nationwide effort is being made

to be sure every child has been immunized against polio, diphtheria, measles, rubella, tetanus and whooping cough.

Kentucky law states no child shall be eligible to enroll as a student in any public or private elementary or secondary school without first presenting a certificate of immunization from a private physician or the local Health Center stating that the child has been immunized. Therefore it will be required that each child entering Nicholas County school from kindergarten through the 12th grade shall present a Certificate of Immunization to his home room teacher the opening day of school in fall of 78.

Those children pre-registered for kindergarten, Head Start and first grade with a valid certificate will not be required to have another. Check with your physician or Health Center to be sure your child has his certificate of immunization, because no child can enroll for the fall term without it.

Immunization clinics are held the last Tuesday and Wednesday of each month at the Nicholas County Health Center.

\$97,192 in road aid for County
