

Florida panther on endangered list

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The Florida panther is one of the most endangered mammals in the U. S. It has been on the endangered species list for several years and is protected by federal and state law. There are probably less than 20 of the 100-pound Big Cypress National Freshwater Reserve on the edge of the Everglades. There are many factors involved in the panther's decline. As late as 1965 there were an estimated 300 left, but human encroachment has gradually lowered that number. The animal has solitary habits and avoids human contact. The panther is also far ranging, requiring about 60 square miles of living space. Poaching is another problem; there have been at

least two panther killings in the last two years.

To census the panther and to formulate plans for its survival, the Florida Panther Recovery Team has been organized by the National Wildlife Federation, in cooperation with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. For the past year the team has investigated several possible panther habitats and has uncovered no new area. The team is very worried about the panther's future because when reported track sightings were investigated, the prints were almost always those of other, bobcat or dog. The Nature Conservancy has preserved the Pascagoula lowlands and is helping the National Park Service acquire additional land for the Big Cypress Reserve. The Conservancy is also encouraging proper management of white tailed deer to insure a steady

food supply for the cats. Hopefully these efforts will insure the panther's continued survival. Nest: environment and health.
