Rice receives award
RICHMOND — Homer C. Rice, the new quarterback coach for the Cincinnati Bengals in the National Football League, is the recipient of Eastern Kentucky University's "Outstanding Alumnus of 1978" award.
Until this month he was head football coach and director of athletics at Rice University.
The award was presented to him Saturday at a banquet during the alumni-commencement weekend on the campus. Rice, a native of Campbell County, was a 1961 graduate of Eastern.
Mr. Rice has served as director of athletics at the University of North Carolina and head football coach at the University of Cincinnati. He also has served as head offensive coach at the University of Oklahoma and the University of Kentucky.
A lecturer and writer on football, Mr. Rice as coach led his players into capturing many NCAA and conference records. In 1961 as a prep school coach he won "the winningest football coach in America" award.
He coached at Highland High School, Ft. Thomas during 1964-61.
His wife is the former Phyllis Wardrup of Middleboro.

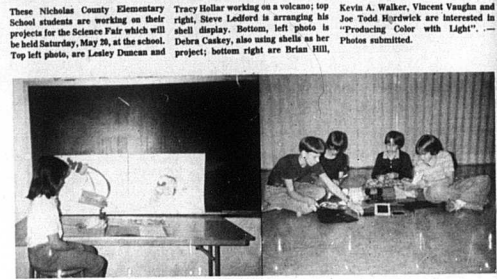

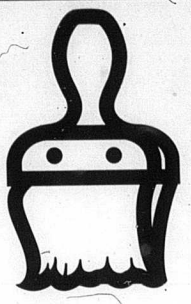
Babe Ruth game in full swing
