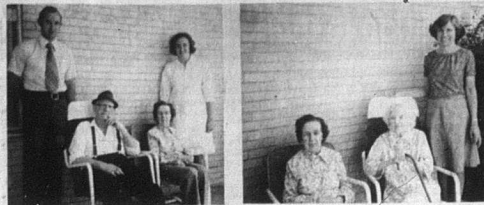

National guard wages battle

Frankfort — The Kentucky National Guard is waging one of the toughest battles in its history. It's not on any battlefield where Kentuckians have fought before as in Philippines, Korea, or Vietnam, this battle is at home and it's for recruits.
Kentucky Adjutant General Billy Wellman has made his top goal to bring the Guard to 100 per cent strength this year.

At the beginning of May, the Kentucky Guard was at 21 1/2 per cent in strength. That means that the Guard now has 5,147 men and women, while it should respond to several reasons. First, the Commonwealth could lose federal revenues amounting to several million dollars because Guard units are not up to full strength. Wellman stated, "It is common knowledge that Washington gives the most money to the states that are full strength." He added, "The Kentucky Guard will have a hard time in the future requesting more units, when we have difficulty filling the existing ones."

The Adjutant General's second reason for the need for full strength is that if the Guard was mobilized or needed now either for war or natural disaster, their job would be harder to fulfill. He noted, "Most Kentuckians feel we were there during the 1974 tornadoes, 1977 floods, the past two winters and if it happens again, they will be protected. But if the Guard is not at full strength and more disasters hit the state, we could be stretched to the limit of our men and machines."

How will the Kentucky Guard recruit 1,000 persons? Wellman said, "We feel if enough Kentuckians become aware of the benefits of the Guard, we can attract more young persons to enlist."

The 1978 session of the Kentucky legislature enacted or continued several programs that benefit Guardsmen. The Kentucky National Guard Educational Encouragement Fund enables Guard members to go to any accredited two or four year college, business or vocational school in the state and the Guard will pay up to half their tuition cost or \$500 per year. Other benefits include special license plates for a one-time \$25 fee, state tax deduction and good insurance and retirement plans, and excellent pay.

Wellman said, "It's still the most important part-time job in the state." He also noted, "Many parents should consider us when advising their child about college expenses. With half of the tuition paid and their weekend drill check, it might be the only method a young person could use to attend a college or vocational school."

What happens if the Guard does not gain 100 per cent strength? The Adjutant General doesn't like to think about that possibility. "We will do everything possible to gain full strength," Wellman said. "If it means moving Guard units to another community, then it will be done," he added. Wellman noted, "Governor Carcass has given us his complete support and
