4-H contest under way

Within the next two weeks the outstanding boy and girl in Nicholas County 4-H will be chosen to go on to state competition and a \$600 savings bond if they win the state award.

The competition is the 1978 4-H Awards of Excellence Program sponsored by The Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times. The annual public service program includes 31 counties in southern Indiana as well as the entire state of Kentucky. University of Kentucky and Purdue University Cooperative Extension Services cooperate to carry out the program through local extension agents.

Participants who are chosen as top Outstanding 4-H boy and girl in Kentucky and southern Indiana will receive a \$600 savings bond. Eight runners-up in Kentucky and one in Indiana will receive a \$100 savings bond each.

All 12 winners, their parents and the county extension agents will receive an all-expense paid trip to Louisville to be guests of honor at the annual Awards Luncheon in March of 1979.

In addition to the selection of the top boy and girl in the state, plaques will be given to the most outstanding 4-H boy and girl in each extension area and plaques will also be awarded to the county winners.
