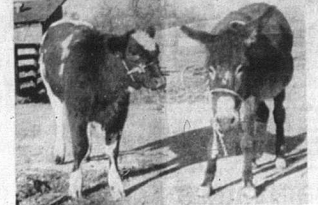
"She'll break 'em to lead, all right," said A. B. Whaley, Heaven II's manager, of his dorky girl that teaches the cattle how to walk around on the south end of a rope. Jenny is currently engaged in teaching some 12 of the although some, old enough to know better, are nervous.

"So it's the younger cattle Jenny is teaching and although she walks to a lead, she also knows how to use her heels when she's teamed with a slow learner.

The North American International Livestock Exhibition opened Nov. 4 in Louisville and will continue through Nov. 17. The "International" has been added this year as a double tribute; one nod to the show's growth and one to the old International, held for so many years in Chicago. It's one of the major shows in the world and it takes place in Louisville, at the Kentucky State Fair grounds. Heaven II Farm is the only Nicholas County entrant and as the day approaches the Maine-Anjous are being washed and clipped and dried on a special show ration that will add gloss to their coat. (Not as well as Mother Nature; a good night's dew or rain is the best thing for a lustrous coat.)

The North American is host to a show of major competitors — four of 18 national beef contests, three of five national dairy competitions and the top three show breeding shows in the country. The exhibition is five years old and already has become one of the top shows in the country with such an array of highlights that it can almost be called a mini-State Fair.

Except that there will be people from all states and some foreign countries there, many of them inspecting a lot of Nicholas County's Heaven II Farm's Maine-Anjou cattle, broken to lead with a little help from a friend named Jenny.
