hours by picking up the phone and calling a friend in Carlisle.
That friend is Mrs. L. C. Robbins or "Miss Carrie" to anyone who's known her more than five minutes. In an interview last week Mrs. Robbins confessed that she was the mystery caller and said the article has generated a lot of excitement for Miss Falls, whom she met in the Atlanta-Macon area several years ago.
"Oh, yes, I met her in Atlanta through friends and our friendship has lasted through the years. She's been up to visit the several times and she knows many people here," Mrs. Robbins said. The article quoted Miss Falls as saying, "You can't get close to people when you grow older. Some you simply can't relate to any more and others live too far away." But those miles haven't lessened her friendship with Mrs. Robbins, nor has the picture of Miss Falls as presented quite like with how Mrs. Robbins remembers her.
"She has more personality than anyone I've ever known," Mrs. Robbins said of her friend. "You could just see somebody who was sick right up when she came in the room."
Mrs. Robbins said Miss Falls had been a nurse all of her life and served with a nursing unit in France during World War I as part of a contingent from the Emory University Hospital, where she worked. She later was a nursing supervisor at the Georgia plant of Johnson and Johnson, the Band-Aid people.
Shortly after the article appeared Miss Falls called Carlisle to tell Mrs. Robbins of the many cards and letters she had received from people she didn't know but who had read the story and sympathized with her problems in facing old age.
"She said she didn't know what the man was up to who came to interview her," Mrs. Robbins said. "She said he didn't have a tape recorder and he only look out a notebook once. She said she thought he had remembered something he had to do later and was writing it down to remember."
Miss Falls thought the reporter was from the Atlanta Constitution and was seeking information about her days in France. She was as surprised as anyone when the article with her name in it was placed on the front page of one of America's most widely-read newspapers.
Mrs. Robbins herself is no stranger to newspapers. She came to work at the Mercury during World War II when all available manpower was occupied with the army. Warren Faber, Mercury publisher, told her "My boys are going off to the service one by one and I can't get a paper out for answering the phone. Will you come down and work for me?"
