development, to accentuate positive thinking and to eliminate the negative. One of the provisions of the proposed UNRSO Declaration on mass media is a requirement that the mass media should present "versions of the facts and presented by states... who consider that the information published or disseminated about them" is unfair or destructive. The Declaration also calls for action by the international community and the individual governments to enforce the Declaration, and one article

claims that "it is the duty of the states... to ensure that mass media coming directly under their jurisdiction act in conformity (with the Declaration)." The freedom of the press and freedom of speech are those small bits of anarchy built into our system to permit public discussion of change. While the practices of a free press may be erratic even in the West, the independent voices of the media better serve the aspirations for freedom than will state control.

Wolf attends meet

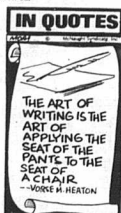
