

'Picturepages' free at local library

Picturepages is coming to the Captain Kangaroo show. And, it is available to pre-school age children in Kentucky through the Nicholas County Public Library.

Picturepages is a five-minute daily learning experience for children which will be presented on the Captain Kangaroo Show beginning in October. The segments will be scheduled for 26 weeks during which Captain Kangaroo will make a Picturepages presentation to a wide young viewers across the country who follow along at home with a booklet, which they have obtained at the library.

According to Barbara Williams, State Librarian, Kentucky Department of Library and Archives, 9,000 material packets for the program will be purchased and distributed to the local public libraries by the state library. The packets include an eight-page color booklet containing five daily lessons which coincide with the television presentation, a parent or teacher, and a list of activities that can be done at home or in the classroom.

Sneak preview

Williams explained that the lessons for the Picturepages segment are designed to help children develop important fundamental learning skills, which underlie intelligent learning behavior. "At the same time," she said, "the lessons get the parents involved in the child's learning experience using the home as a classroom. The Picturepages packet for the six-week period contains 30 new and different lessons with 100 lessons and follow-up activities for each lesson."

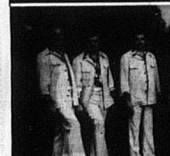
