### DNR opens new 'hotline'

The Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection today announced a new service for Kentuckians, a 24-hour toll-free line for assistance and information on environmental problems.

The "hotline," operated by the department's Office of Communications and Community Affairs, is designed so all calls can be answered as quickly as possible. Personnel in each of the department's divisions have taken on the added duty of responding to each request for information. Each request will be followed up by either a phone call, a letter or a personal interview if necessary.

The toll-free phone number may be used to report environmental problems such as illegal dumping, air and noise pollution, strip mine violations or water pollution. Also, schedules of public hearings, copies of regulations, informational literature and even a guest speaker from the department can be requested. A department spokesman cautioned, however, that environmental emergencies still should be reported to the Kentucky Disaster and Emergency Service at 502-564-7815.

During office hours (8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday) the phone will be answered by department personnel. After hours, a device attached to the phone will record all requests. The number is 1-800-327-2991.
