Paris-Maysville line studied
The Paris-Maysville rail line, which passes through Nicholas County and Carlisle, is one of five lines in Kentucky recommended for assistance under the Railroad Revitalization and Regulatory Reform Act of 1976.

The act set up new application procedures for rail companies which want to shut down lines that are unprofitable or in poor condition. The measure also provides federal aid to subsidize rail service on lines that have been approved for abandonment by the Interstate Commerce Commission, provided these lines meet certain criteria.

The first phase of the Kentucky rail plan, which reviewed 15 state branch lines facing possible abandonment, will be presented at two public hearings Nov. 4 in Elizabethton. The meetings will be held at the Holiday Inn North at 1:30 and 7:30 p.m.

Kentucky's Department of Transportation, which is developing the plan, hired CONRAD Corp. to study the lines in the state facing abandonment. The consultant's draft plan recommends assistance for five lines, including the Louisville and Nashville Railroad's Paris-Maysville branch.

Kentucky C of C issues 'report cards'
The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce has released its "report card" for the 1978 General Assembly and both Nicholas County representatives "passed" on their performance concerning business issues before the 1978 session.

State Sen. Ed Ford of Cynthiana was graded at 73 by the state Chamber and Rep. Adrian Arnold received a 60. The grade was based on votes made during the past session on several specific bills.

The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce describes those legislators who received a total of 100 using the chamber scale were rated as "favorable" to the group and its aims. A score of 40 to 59 indicated a "divided" rating and anything under that was termed "unfavorable."

Some of the bills included in the ratings were authorization of teachers, product liability, unemployment compensation, workmen's compensation and a tax on litter.

BGI chopper flies for blood

Bios Graze Industries' Bell Long Ranger helicopter flew through the early morning skies Oct. 12 on a mission of mercy for a Nicholas Countyman.

Bios Graze pilot Dick Gragert was called at 4:45 a.m. Thursday and asked to fly to Lexington in the Central Kentucky Blood Center to pick up an urgently-needed four units of blood for

a patient at the Nicholas County Hospital.

Gragert responded quickly and the round trip was completed by 8:30 a.m. This was the first time that Bios Graze has donated the use of the helicopter for a blood run although it had been used previously last fall during a manhunt for a missing patient from the nursing home.

The project is to be funded with 70 per cent federal and 30 per cent county road aid money, according to Transportation Secretary Calvin Grayson.

The federal share of the project cost comes from the off-system federal aid highway program, established in 1975
